REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen is pleased to submit the following for inclusion in the Annual Town Report for calendar year 2016:

The Annual Town Election in May saw the re-election of Brian J. Bezanson and Scott J. Lambiase for a three year term. During the reorganization of the Board of Selectmen at their meeting on May 10, 2016, Dr. Carl F. Kowalski was re-elected to the position of Chairman, Daniel L. Salvucci was re-elected to the position of Vice Chairman and Scott J. Lambiase was re-elected to the position of Clerk of the Board. Because the vote was taken prior to the Annual Town Election, the Board voted to reaffirm the aforementioned votes at their meeting held on May 24, 2016.

At the January 5, 2016 meeting of the Board of Selectmen, the Board took great pleasure in recognizing Daniel Gould, Parker Miner, Matthew O'Brien, Kyle Stokinger, Liam Stokinger and Joseph Venuti on achieving the rank of Eagle Scout. Daniel's community service project involved stenciling the sewer drains; Parker's community service project involved painting rooms at the First Baptist Church of Hanson; Matthew's community service project involved repairing, cleaning and painting the pool house at the Town pool; Kyle's community project involved stenciling the sewer drains; Liam's community project involved painting the boarded areas of the Park Avenue School; and Joseph's community project involved restoring the roundhouse at the MBTA Commuter Rail Station. The Selectmen congratulate Daniel, Parker, Matthew, Kyle, Liam and Joseph on their achievements and extend best wishes for continued success in the future.

At the Selectmen's meeting held on January 19, 2016, Assistant Town Administrator Gregory Enos announced that the Town was the recipient of a Green Communities Grant in the amount of \$166,215. The funds will be utilized to replace interior and exterior lighting at the Town Hall, Council on Aging, Whitman Public Library and Fire Department. In addition, pumps and motor drives at some of the pumping stations throughout Town will also be replaced. The Board of Selectmen extends deep gratitude to Mr. Enos for all of the time and effort he put forth in obtaining the Green Communities Grant.

At their meeting of March 22, 2016, the Board of Selectmen voted to accept the Rules and Regulations and Enforcement Policy for the Licensing of Alcoholic Beverage Sales in the Town of Whitman. The policy was forwarded to the Alcoholic Beverages Control Commission; and was distributed to all liquor license holders within Town by Chief of Police Scott Benton. With the establishment of said policy and continued improvement by the Board in the handling of liquor license violations, the goal of reducing legal fees associated with said violations can hopefully be obtained. The Board commends Town Administrator Francis Lynam and Assistant Town Administrator Gregory Enos for all of their efforts in putting together the policy; and extends deep gratitude to Chief Benton for his role in distributing said policy to all liquor license holders within the Town.

At the Selectmen's meeting held on April 5, 2016, the Board accepted the resignation of Assistant Town Administrator Gregory Enos. After almost four years of dedicated service, Mr. Enos accepted the position of Human Resources Director for the Town of Ashland. The Board extends deep gratitude to Mr. Enos for his service to the Town; and congratulates and wishes him every success in his new role.

At the April 19, 2016 meeting of the Board of Selectmen, Town Administrator Francis Lynam and Treasurer-Collector Mary Beth Carter discussed issues that had arisen in connection with the Passport Acceptance Service program being provided by the Town Col-

lector's office. It was Mr. Lynam's recommendation to discontinue the service at the end of the year unless another Town department expressed interest in taking it over. At the Selectmen's meeting held on November 1, 2016, Mr. Lynam announced that the Whitman Public Library, Council on Aging and Recreation Director Oliver Amado were interested in assuming the Passport Acceptance Service program. After reviewing the three proposals, the Board voted to allow the Council on Aging to assume the administration of the Passport Acceptance Service program upon discontinuance of said program by the Town Treasurer-Collector. The Board of Selectmen would like to thank the Whitman Public Library and Recreation Director Oliver Amado for their willingness to assume the continuance of the program; and wishes the Council on Aging great success in their new endeavor.

On November 1, 2016, the Board of Selectmen interviewed two candidates for the position of Town Administrator. Following the interviews, the Board voted unanimously to appoint Lisa Green to the position of Assistant Town Administrator. The Board congratulates Mrs. Green and wishes her the best of luck.

At the December 13, 2016 meeting of the Board of Selectmen, Town Administrator Francis Lynam presented the Board with a painting of the Town Park gazebo. Said painting was donated to the Town by resident Nita Sault. The Board would like to express their appreciation to Ms. Sault for her kind and generous donation.

In closing, the Board of Selectmen extends heartfelt thanks to all Town departments and their employees for their dedicated service to the community; thank you to those who volunteer their time and expertise to serve on various boards and committees in the Town; and thank you to the residents of Whitman for the support you show for your Town and those who serve you.

ANNUAL TOWN MEETING MAY 2, 2016 (FY17)

Moderator Michael Seele introduces Michael Hayes from the Electronic Voting Study Committee. He presents the committee's findings and concerns thus far. The Town voted IN THE MAJORITY to a non-binding vote to further study the feasibility of incorporating electronic voting for future Town Meetings.

The Annual Town Meeting was called to order at 7:49 p.m. by Moderator Michael M. Seele. He asked for the count of voters. Detective Officer Daniel Connolly announced the count of the voters present was 243, constituting the quorum requirement of 50 voters. The meeting pledged allegiance to the flag and Pastor Carolyn Tryggstad of the Joy in Christ Lutheran Church gave the invocation. A moment of silence was held for deceased Town employees who died in 2015. Assistant Town Clerk Mary R. Holland swore in the following tellers: Lawrence Roache, 26 Acorn Rd., Daniel P. Cullity, 4 Locust Hill Ln., Joseph P. Drier, 7 Oakdale Farm Rd. and Michael F. Hayes, 18 Diane Ter. She then read the warrant. Moderator Seele went over the rules governing town meeting. Moderator Seele acknowledged the Finance Committee on their service to the town.

At 7:58 P.M. Moderator Michael Seele adjourned the Annual Town Meeting and opened the Special Town Meeting. **The Special Town Meeting is recorded in a separate document.**

Special Town Meeting adjourned at 8:08 p.m. and the Annual Town Meeting was reconvened.

Yard Sale Permits

Yard Sale Permit Bylaw

It is the intent of this by-law that a mechanism be provided to place reasonable and appropriate controls on the activity of offering for sale secondhand articles within residential areas of the Town of Whitman (hereinafter "Town"). It is also the intent of this by-law to ensure that groups, individuals or corporations who or which customarily engage in the sale of secondhand articles as a business are limited to those locations within the Town that are designated by the Zoning bylaws for such business activities.

Town of Whitman citizens are advised that additional state laws and regulations may apply to the conduct of such sales activities, including but not limited to sales and use tax regulations. These laws and regulations may require additional permits and licensing.

Yard sales may be held in the Town pursuant to a permit granted by the Office of the Selectmen, subject to the following conditions:

(1) Subject to any additional limitations imposed by state laws or regulations, the number of garage/yard sales an owner or resident or qualified organization may conduct shall be limited to three per calendar year.

(2) All material available for the sale shall originate from the premises on which the sale takes place or from other residential properties in the immediate neighborhood.

(3) No sign or advertising device shall be placed within any street right-of-way, including freestanding signs, or any sign affixed to street signs, traffic and regulatory warning signs or any utility poles within such right-of-way. No such sign or advertising device shall be placed on any public tree. Signs shall not be displayed more than 48 hours prior to the start of the sale and must be removed within 24 hours after the conclusion of the sale. All signs shall meet the Town's sign bylaw standards.

(5) No person customarily engaged in the business of conducting second hand sales shall participate in any way in a garage sale directly or indirectly unless said garage/yard sale is conducted on said person's property and then, only providing that none of the material is brought in from outside sources for purpose of resale.

(6) Such sale shall not exceed two consecutive days' duration. The hours of operation for any yard sale shall be limited to between 9:00 AM and 7:00 PM, unless terminated earlier at the direction of the Whitman Police Department. All unsold items or objects shall be stored out of public view by 7:30 PM.

(7) The permittee shall be responsible for orderly parking and traffic flow. If parking or traffic flow conditions create a threat to the safety of the public, the yard sale shall be terminated at the request of the Whitman Police Department.

(8) No yard sale event shall be held at a time or place so that it creates a public nuisance, violates any other provision of the Town's by-laws, creates unreasonable noise or disturbance, and/or negatively impacts or interferes with any other public event in the community.

The permittee must apply at least four (4) days prior to the commencement of the yard sale. The Board of Selectmen shall establish a fee schedule for the permit. The owner shall be responsible for obtaining a permit for each yard sale and for compliance with this bylaw. Tenants renting a home and seeking a yard sale permit must present written authorization from the property owner to hold a yard sale prior to being granted a permit.

The Whitman Police Department is authorized to enforce this yard sale by-law by issuing non-criminal citations as provided by M.G.L. c.40, §21D and by Article XVIII of these by-laws. Failure to comply with this bylaw will result in a fine of \$25 for the first offense and \$100.00 for the second and each subsequent offense.

And replace with the following:

Article XXVII Section XX Release of Dogs from Custody

A dog, which has been picked up and in the custody of the Animal Control Officer, will not be released to its owner or keeper unless the following fees have been paid.

- A. A pickup fee of \$30.00
- B. A fee of \$10.00 per day for each day the dog has been in the Animal Control Officers care (see MGL Ch140 s151A)
- C. If not licensed, a paid receipt from the office of the Town Clerk showing proper license fee (under section II) has been paid and that all late fees have been paid.
- D. All fines assessed must be paid within 21 days, if such fines are applicable.

Article XXVI "Pit Bull Terriers:"

Delete Article XXVI, as it currently reads, in its entirety:

~~No person shall keep or maintain within the boundary limits of the Town of Whitman, the breed of dogs known as American Staffordshire Terrier, Staffordshire Pit Bull Terrier, or Bull Terrier, unless the same is restrained on the private property of the owner in a secure area so that the animal cannot gain access to public areas, or private property of others.~~

~~Any owner transporting a "pit bull" on the public ways for medical or veterinary care shall properly restrain and muzzle the animal. Any such dog, not properly restrained and not wearing a muzzle shall constitute a public nuisance and be banned within the limits of the Town of Whitman.~~

~~Section 2. Violations and Penalties. Any person who violates this by law shall be subject to a fine of not more than \$50.00 for each offense, and the said dog shall be banned from the limits of the Town. Each subsequent offense shall be considered a separate offense under this by law.~~

Section XVIII of Article XXVII, Fines and Penalties:

Delete Section XVIII of Article XXVII, as it currently read, in its entirety:

Article XXVII Section XVII

~~Fine and Penalties: Any owner or keeper of a dog who shall fail to comply with any provisions of this by law and laws governing dogs, shall be fined as follows~~

All Whitman households with barn animals are required to apply for a permit with the Board of Health in order for the town to have a census of these animals. Inspections are done on a yearly basis and are up to date.

When the Board of Health is notified by a hospital, physician or veterinarian of animal bites to either humans or domestic animals the involved animals are quarantined as per state guidelines. Due to the increased incidents of rabies in our area, the Board of Health requests that all dog owners vaccinate and license their dogs and follow the Town of Whitman Dog Control Regulations. Also, in accordance with MA law all cats must be vaccinated against rabies. Please visit www.whitman-ma.gov for information on Whitman's yearly Rabies Clinic.

REPORT OF THE TREASURER-COLLECTOR

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Whitman:
I would like to thank the Treasurer-Collector staff for their support and hard work this fiscal year. Michele Hayes - Assistant Treasurer-Collector, Sheri Maroney - Clerk, Collector's Office, Mary Butler - Payroll Clerk, Treasurer's Office, Jennifer DeVasto - Benefits Clerk, Treasurer's Office, and Victoria Campanile - Clerk, Treasurer's Office.

The Treasurer's Office and the Collector's Office are responsible for many important functions. In the Treasurer's Office the functions include payroll, employee and retiree benefits, debt issuance, cash flow and investments, tax title and trust fund administration, cash receipts, expenditures, and many other payment and record keeping tasks.

In the Collector's Office the functions include the issuance and collection of all real estate, personal property, excise, boat, trash and water bills as well as the collection of all monies turned over by Town departments. The office is responsible for issuing Municipal Lien Certificates and handles all billing and payment inquiries from taxpayers, mortgage companies and real estate attorneys. The Collector's Office processes daily turnovers to the Accountant, and processes all files received from tax service companies and all payments received from the deputy collector.

The Treasurer-Collector's Office continued to be a Passport Acceptance Facility in fiscal year 2016. The office processed approximately 500 passport applications in fiscal year 2016. The Passport Acceptance Agents for the Department of State from the Town of Whitman in fiscal year 2016 were Mary Beth Carter, Michele Hayes, Sheri Maroney, Jennifer DeVasto and Victoria Campanile.

A complete analysis of the Town's receipts and expenditures for fiscal year 2016 can be found in the Report of the Town Accountant. A detailed report of the total receipts collected during fiscal year 2016 and a schedule of the Town's debt obligations follows this report.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL ON AGING

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Whitman:

The following is the Report of the Council on Aging for the year ending December 31, 2016.

The Whitman Council on Aging is responsible for coordinating and/or sponsoring programs for the elderly, as well as helping to provide the necessary services needed by the elderly of our community and to insure a higher level of personal involvement in area activities for citizens of Whitman who are 60 years of age or older. The Senior Center is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm. The COA requests residents contact the Center and advise us of any person who might benefit from provided services.

Sadly, in September of this year we lost a valued member of our Council on Aging Board with Jean McDonald's passing. Jean's mornings were spent at the Senior Center placing telephone outreach calls to seniors who had requested a 'friendly call' each morning. Jean's phone contact each day served to enhance these individuals' lives with sociability and friendship. We will miss Jean and will be forever thankful for her extraordinary commitment to our elders.

Unfortunately, we also accepted the resignation from the Board of Robert Titterington. Bob, a former bus driver for the Senior Center, was an integral part of the Center for many years and we sincerely thank him for his dedication to the Board.

Whitman resident Thomas G. Ford was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Council on Aging Board. We welcome Tom, look forward to working with him, and thank him for his commitment to the elders of our Town.

The Council on Aging Board meets at 9:00 am on the second Tuesday of each month at the Senior Center. Meetings are open to interested residents. The Director and Council Members are delegates to, and attend regular meetings held for, the COA, OCPC, CIRCA, MCOA and OCES. Director Barbara J. Garvey; Administrative Assistant Linda Kelly; Clerical Assistants Patty Caley and Elaine Cox; Social Worker Theresa Altieri; Bus Drivers Gerard LaPierre, Gerry Voss, and Frank Farrar; and Old Colony Elder Services Meal Site Manager Fran Cruise make up the staff. In addition to our staff, we have many volunteers who give thousands of hours of time and effort, providing incalculable contributions to our community.

We are pleased to report that Senior Center building improvements this year included the addition of an awning over the back deck that provides much needed shade for outside activities held there. The building's original and aging heating and cooling system was also replaced this year.

A senior lunch program is held at the Center every weekday. Home delivered meals ('Meals on Wheels') are delivered to approximately 30 seniors a day, five days per week. Food is supplied through Old Colony Elder Services. Approximately 12,000 meals were served and delivered this year to Whitman elders in need. The kindness and generosity of many volunteers helps to make the nutrition program run smoothly.

The Council on Aging maintains two 17 passenger minibuses acquired through the Mobility Assistance Program. At least one bus is used every day for a variety of activities that include transportation to the Senior Center for lunch, activities or appointments, Around Town for errands on Mondays, food shopping on Tuesdays, as well as shopping, social, recreational and cultural trips. Dial-A-Bat is used Monday through Friday primarily for medical appointment transportation.

Many successful motor coach bus trips and monthly Social Luncheons have taken place this year, thanks to volunteer Terry Seer. Ongoing Senior Center activities include knitting, craft classes, computer classes, a weekly art group, bingo, cards, Mah Jongg, walking group, Book Buzz group, and Wii bowling. Chess, Bananagrams, Left Center Right, 'Coloring for Stress Relief', cribbage, and Men's cards and have been added to our activities this year. Folks that come into the Center enjoy working on the daily word search or other brain exercising puzzles that are placed on the tables each morning.

Also available at the Senior Center are blood pressure screenings, podiatrist appointments, hearing screenings, and help with applying for Fuel Assistance. Local Attorney Ron Whitney volunteers monthly to offer free legal service to our seniors. Hairdresser services are offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays by Kathy Dunbar.

Our ongoing outreach efforts include the electronic well-check program through the Plymouth County Deputy Sheriff's Office. The "Brown Bag" food program continues to be successful by providing approximately 200 Whitman families with a bag of groceries once each month. This valuable program is a collaboration between the Whitman Food Pantry, The Greater Boston Food Bank, Dorn-Davies Senior Center and the Whitman Council on Aging.

We continue to plan and provide new and informative programs to address the needs and concerns of our senior population, including some evening programming to allow for attendance by caregivers of elders as well as by 'baby boomers' who are still working during the day.

In collaboration with the Whitman Board of Health and NVNA and Hospice, we were able to offer health and wellness programs at the Senior Center this year including “Can I Have My Cake and Eat it Too?”, “Diabetes Self-Management”, and “Health Care Planning – Honoring Choices”.

Teaming with various community partners, we were able to offer several presentations including “Reduce Pain Through Self-Hypnosis”, “Celebrating 65 and the Possibilities it Brings”, and “Health Benefits of Chocolate”. The Whitman Fire and Police Departments held informative monthly Coffee Hours at the Senior Center.

Our social and cultural activities were very well attended and this year included an apple pie social, pizza parties, ice cream socials, holiday luncheons, a Christmas luncheon with musical entertainment by the Resonators Jazz Trio, and monthly movies at the Senior Center. We are (and have been for the past 30+ years) immensely grateful for the generosity of the Knights of Columbus organization for hosting and providing free of charge the Annual Thanksgiving Dinner for close to 400 of our community's elders.

Through a much appreciated grant from the Whitman Cultural Council, we were able to offer “Songbirds of the Northeast” with naturalist John Root.

In addition to our ‘usual’ destinations, this year we traveled to Plainridge Park Casino, the Brass Lantern Restaurant at South Shore Vo-Tech in Hanover, Fuller Craft Museum, Wrentham Outlets, Vanity Fair Outlets in Dartmouth, Penny Lane Consignment Shop and the Dunbar Restaurant and Tea Room in Sandwich, Patriot Place in Foxborough, Wareham Crossing, Highfields Hall and Gardens and Silver Lounge Restaurant in Falmouth, Boston's North End and Haymarket Square, Newburyport, Castle Island, Cape Cod Canal Cruise, John F. Kennedy Presidential Library and Museum in Boston, Marshfield Fair, Worcester Art Museum, Concord River Cruise, a visit to Chatham, Roger Williams Park Zoo, Salem/Peabody Essex Museum, our annual visit to the National Cemetery in Bourne during the week of Veterans Day, and LaSalette Shrine in Attleboro at Christmas.

During the tax season a volunteer tax preparer, Mary Sheard, is available by appointment to aid Whitman seniors in the preparation of their tax return, free of charge. Theresa Altieri is our SHINE (Serving Health Information Needs of Everyone) Counselor and is available by appointment to assist with any Medicare, Medicaid, HMO, or other Medigap insurance issues. She can also assist with completing applications for MassHealth or SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) benefits.

Our Senior Tax Work Program is made up of approximately thirty senior homeowners. Through this program, selected seniors volunteer in town departments for a total of one hundred hours, qualifying them for an \$800.00 real estate tax abatement. We were able to utilize the skills of these seniors in the Building Department, Town Clerk's Office, Fire Department, Library, Duval School, Conley School, and the Senior Center. The program continues to be a huge success thanks to the cooperation of the town departments and the hard work of our senior volunteers.

Our knitting group continues to knit and crochet warm hats, scarves, mittens, sweaters and afghans that are donated to Altrusa who in turn distributes the items to homeless shelters, hospitals and shelters for abused women and children.

Thank you to the merchants who support our “Seen Your News” letter with advertising. This monthly newsletter is distributed to every Whitman resident over the age of 59 and provides medical, legal, safety and social information.

The Senior Center was utilized this year by: AA, Republican Town Committee, Democratic Town Committee, TOPS, and Friends of Whitman Seniors group.

New this year was our first annual "Santa's Elves for Whitman Seniors" Giving Tree at the Senior Center. The response was both overwhelming and heartwarming. With 156 gift cards to Whitman establishments donated to the Giving Tree, we were able to brighten the Christmas holidays for over fifty of our very grateful senior neighbors. We sincerely appreciate the kindness and generosity of those who participated. This 'pilot project' proved to be a true community effort and we look forward to next year's 2nd Annual "Santa's Elves for Whitman Seniors" Giving Tree.

The Council on Aging works closely with the Executive Office of Elder Affairs, NVNA (Norwell Visiting Nurse Association), Whitman Housing Authority, Old Colony Planning Council, Old Colony Elder Services, Catholic Charities, Self-Help, the Salvation Army and various other civic groups in town to provide necessary services to all our elderly. We would especially like to recognize all those who volunteer time delivering meals, working at the luncheons, teaching classes, making calls, and 'stepping up' when requested.

Again this year, our greatest challenge is the lack of space at the Senior Center. The department has evolved from a small recreational center into a large human services department with many ongoing activities. With limited parking spaces at the Senior Center, we have reached out to the VFW and the Knights of Columbus, both of whom have graciously allowed participants in our trips to park in their lots during our day-long trips, thereby freeing up parking space at the Senior Center for those using the building. We will continue our efforts to work on expansion so that we can continue to meet the growing needs of our community.

As a Council we would like to thank the community and voters for the support of our programs and ask for your continued cooperation. We would again like to thank our Director, Barbara Garvey, and staff for their dedication to the seniors of Whitman and for pursuing grants and programs which benefit our seniors as well as the Town of Whitman. With their help and efforts, we will continue to provide quality programs for the community.

ANNUAL REPORT WHITMAN CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Whitman Conservation Commission is a five-member board appointed by the Selectmen and is the local agency specifically charged with the management and protection of Whitman's natural resources. The Commission's major duty is to interpret and administer the regulations of the Wetland Protection Act as they apply within the area of Whitman. Meetings are held at 7:30PM on the first and third Tuesdays of each month in the meeting room in the lower Town Hall. Other meetings and public hearings are scheduled as needed. All meetings are open to the public and townspeople are invited to attend and to bring to the attention of the Commission members any questions or information relating to environmental affairs.

The Conservation Commission continues throughout the year to perform site inspections, hold public hearings, rule on specific cases of wetland applicability for building projects which impact on wetlands and answer citizen questions and complaints about infringement on wetlands areas. Over 60 site inspections were made by Commission members, and 18 public hearings were held during the year. 15 Orders of Conditions were issued by the Commission, and 2 extensions of Order of Conditions were issued. In addition, 10 Certificates of Compliance were issued for work completed under terms of Orders of Conditions issued previously. One ANRAD was issued, and one Amended Order of Conditions was issued during the past year. The Commission also ruled on 1 Request for Determination of Applicability of the Wetlands Protection Act. Commission members also continued their treatment program for weed control at Harding and Hobart Ponds during this summer. The treatment program is administered by Solitude Lake Management (formerly Aquatic Control Technology).

Commission members are always available to meet with citizens who have questions or concerns about abutters' property or work being done on the property. They always follow up any questionable case by meeting with the individual to work out the proper procedures for complying with the law. Commission members review all site plans submitted to other town boards in order to determine if there is wetlands jurisdiction, notifying the appropriate

agency if this is the case. Commission members also attend many hearings held by the Board of Appeals and Planning Board and meet with the Building Inspector to gather information about projects that will eventually come before the Conservation Commission. This past year member Josh Kimball attended the Annual meeting of the Mass. Association of Conservation Commissions.

The Conservation Commission shares meeting space with other town boards in the lower town hall. Our files are now centralized in one place and are easy for members to access at any time. We hope to be assigned some office space in town hall in future. All members attempt to be present for all meetings, in order to ensure a quorum for hearings and for service to citizens. Many questions from citizens are referred to us from town hall offices, and we do our best to provide information and answer those questions for citizens.

The Commission has four regular members at this time. In the past year one member resigned, and another declined to be reappointed. Associate Member Josh Kimball was appointed at that time to full membership and has been active on the board, at meetings and with site inspections around town.

The Conservation Commission is grateful to Eagle Scout candidate Patrick McCollem for his project of clearing the walking trail at Hobart Pond, removing debris and constructing a bridge over a stream in the area to improve recreational use of the pond and walking trail areas.

The Conservation Commission is grateful to the many people who have contributed their service and knowledge throughout the year, as well as to the many citizens who have made them aware of problem situations. Commission members appreciate having had the opportunity to serve the townspeople of Whitman and acknowledge the cooperation of the various town boards in carrying out their duties.

COUNTY OF PLYMOUTH COOPERATIVE EXTENSION – ANNUAL REPORT JUNE 30, 2015 –JULY 1, 2016

The role of the County of Plymouth Cooperative Extension is to deliver research-based information to Plymouth County residents through non-formal methods. The Plymouth County Extension staff work in concert with UMass Amherst faculty and Extension staff on behalf of Plymouth County residents to provide valuable information in one of Extension's four major program areas: '4-H Youth and Family Development'.

The Extension System is supported by mainly County funds and supplemented with Federal (USDA) and State funds, and operates under Federal and State laws and agreements. Local citizens, appointed by the Plymouth County Commissioners, serve as The

County of Plymouth Cooperative Extension Trustees, directing the overall program. Volunteer advisory groups work with Extension staff on developing programs.

County of Plymouth Extension Highlights FY 16:

Hort Notes is the UMass Extension Newsletter for Green industry professionals and is published bi-weekly from March through October, for Green Industry professionals. Approximately 800 MA green industry businesses and municipalities subscribe to Hort Notes, including 53 in Plymouth County.

- The Plymouth County Extension office continues to be a local resource to commercial fruit and vegetable growers, farmers and commercial turf professionals, providing a local and regional link to the UMass agricultural network.

County of Plymouth Extension 4-H Program

Plymouth County Extension 4-H program reaches over 8,000 youth annually by educational outreach through the 4-H program in Plymouth County. The Plymouth County Extension 4-H Program has a variety of ways that youth are reached including traditional 4-H clubs, school enrichment programs, after school programs and collaboration with community organizations.

Traditional 4-H Program- The 4-H program is a collaboration of programs and funding provided by United States Department of Agriculture, UMass Extension and Plymouth County. The 4-H program is over 100 years old and is still active in Plymouth County today. The 4-H Club Program provides youth with a caring adult, a safe place to meet over an extended period of time, providing mentoring and building self-esteem while teaching life skills to members. The 4-H program provides youth with opportunities to achieve and become productive members of society and the social and academic experiences needed to prepare them up for a lifetime of learning and community participation. All 4-H Clubs are required to participate in community service at the county level and many do individual club projects. All Clubs are also required to complete financial and club reports to the Extension Office each summer. Each 4-H Club is also required to get an EIN for the club and are eligible to open a bank account if desired. The Extension Office provides support and completes required reporting for UMass and National 4-H. The Plymouth County 4-H Program has 45 4-H clubs countywide providing hands on education in animal and equine sciences, agriculture, healthy lifestyles, science and technology, environmental stewardship, community service, leadership, citizenship and public speaking projects.

4-H Volunteers

- The Plymouth County 4-H program has over 200 volunteers that participate in various ways with in the 4-H program. Many are 4-H club leaders, on advisory boards and councils serve as judges, workshop leaders, and have middle management opportunities to help with program delivery and events including community service programs. The value of a volunteer in Massachusetts is currently \$29.00 per hour. Many 4-H volunteers donate several hours per year to the 4-H program in Plymouth County. As part of the Massachusetts 4-H Program, Plymouth County 4-H mandates the Volunteer Risk Management program which incorporates background information, reference forms, and screening on all 4-H volunteers. All Plymouth County 4-H Volunteers go through a training and orientation program to work with youth in all capacities.

4-H School Enrichment

- Plymouth County Extension offers a school enrichment 4-H Embryology Program to all schools and libraries in Plymouth County. 19 Towns participate in this 4-H School Enrichment program where students learn about developmental biology by following the development of chickens through incubation. New for FY 16, fertile eggs were obtained through UConn Poultry Farm and several local Plymouth County 4-H volunteers. This program would not be possible without help from our local agriculture community. A total of 3,500 students participated from the following towns: Abington, MA; Bridgewater, MA; Brockton, MA; Duxbury, MA; East Bridgewater, MA; Hanover, MA; Hanson, MA; Hingham, MA; Kingston, MA; Marion, MA; Marshfield, MA; Middleboro, MA; Plymouth, MA; Plympton, MA; Rochester, MA; Scituate, MA; West Bridgewater, MA; and Whitman, MA.
- The Plymouth County 4-H Sunflower program reached 1,000 students and 25 teachers through a 4-H Plant Science program. This 4-H program is offered, free of charge, to all Plymouth County Schools and Libraries. 4-H School Enrichment programs work directly with staff at local schools allowing educators to integrate activities into their curricula enriching the classroom with hands on project that is pertinent to an area of study. Curriculum is provided by the Plymouth County Extension Office. School Districts from the following towns participated in FY 16: Brockton, MA; Carver, MA; Duxbury, MA; Hanson, MA; Halifax, MA; Hull, MA; Kingston, MA; Marion, MA; Mattapoisett, MA; Middleboro, MA; Norwell, MA; Plymouth, MA; Plympton, MA; Rockland, MA and West Bridgewater, MA.
- New for 2016, short term gardening programs were offered as part of the school enrichment program. Through work with our 4-H program assistant, the Extension Office offered 2 hour classes on horticulture and gardening with a hands on activity. Hanson public schools participated in this new program.

4-H After-School Programs

- The Plymouth County Extension 4-H Babysitting Course teaches youth how to care for young children and teaches responsibility and business skills. Youth must be at least 12 years old to participate in this course. This program is offered as an after-school program at local libraries schools and community organizations in Plymouth County. Youth from Abington, East Bridgewater, Halifax, Hull, Hanson, Pembroke, Plymouth, Plympton and Wareham participated in FY 16.
- Plymouth County 4-H offered 4-H science and animal science programs in FY 16 to school districts and libraries in the county. The 4-H Animal Ambassador program teaches youth about marine science and livestock animals through hands on activities and experiences. This program is for youth in grades K-3. In addition, 4-H science projects were offered activities in astronomy, geology, ecology, chemistry, physics, technology and engineering. In FY 16, Plymouth County 4-H was asked to write and provide curriculum for this successful program for all of Massachusetts 4-H to use for 4-H Impact programing.

4-H Club Programing & Life Skills

- Each October, Plymouth County Extension 4-H organizes a county wide 4-H Community Service project called the '4-H Food Drive' and has collected, approximately 18,000 pounds of food collected by 4-H Clubs and 4-H Volunteers and donated to the

South Shore Community Action Council and other local pantries. In addition, 4-H Clubs participate in other community service activities including the Massachusetts Coast Sweep Beach Clean-up event and collecting items for local shelters. The 4-H Ambassador Teen Club also made and donated 100 bags to help homeless children in Plymouth County. 4-H family bags were donated to shelters in Marshfield, Brockton and Wareham for kids that are in difficult situations. 4-H Clubs often do their own community service projects as well which include therapy dog visits to nursing homes, beautification projects at community centers, donations to animal shelters and many more throughout the County.

- The Plymouth County Extension 4-H Program holds an annual Public Speaking Contest at the Silver Lake Regional Middle School in Kingston. 4-H Public Speaking is an important skill for all youth, necessary for school and as they enter the workforce later in life. 4-H Public Speaking contests are evaluated by judges and all materials, training and curriculum is provided by the Plymouth County Extension Office. 4-H members also record public service announcements for local TV and radio including WATD in Marshfield. 100 youth from the following towns participated at Plymouth County Extension 4-H Visual Presentation Contest: Abington, MA; Bridgewater, MA; Carver, MA; Duxbury, MA; East Bridgewater, MA; Halifax, MA; Hanson, MA; Hanover, MA; Hingham, MA; Hull, MA; Kingston, MA; Marion, MA; Marshfield, MA; Middleboro, MA; Pembroke, MA; Plymouth, MA; Plympton, MA; Scituate, MA; Wareham, MA and West Bridgewater, MA.
- Plymouth County 4-H Horse Program emphasizes safety in all equine activities and aims to develop horsemanship skills through knowledge on equine selection, nutrition and management. Caring for horses provides an outdoor fitness program for physical, personal and emotional development including confidence building. The program can develop into a life-long hobby or career for youth. The Plymouth County 4-H Horse Program offers youth in the program to participate in the Horse Bowl/Hippology contests each year. The contest gives an opportunity for youth enrolled in 4-H horse projects to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding of equine science and management in a competitive setting where attitudes and fairness prevail. The Plymouth County 4-H Horse Program consists of 13 clubs and over 20 volunteers dedicating their time, energy, passion and horse knowledge to Plymouth County youth. New for FY 16 was a 4-H Leveling Horsemanship program which incorporates equine knowledge, safety and riding for 4-H members. Plymouth County was chosen to pilot this new 4-H program for Massachusetts 4-H.
- Plymouth County Extension 4-H has formed partnerships with various groups around the county, including: O'Neil Dairy Farm, Duxbury, Weir River Farm, Hingham, the Marshfield Agriculture Society, Marshfield; South Shore Natural Science Center, Norwell, Cranberry Acres, Marshfield, Big Bay Farm, Hanover; Crooked Lane Farm, Duxbury; Seagate Farm, Marshfield; Dusty J Farm, Kingston; Mare Willow Farm, Plymouth; Norwell Farms, Norwell; South Shore Public Charter School, Norwell; Soule Homestead, Middleboro; Wareham Woods, Wareham; and Dias and Daughters Farm, Norton. Many of these partnerships are formed so youth can work directly with knowledgeable staff at these locations and learn about local history and agriculture. These venues also offer the opportunity for youth experience hands on training on a working farm and to lease livestock for 4-H programs.
- The Marshfield Fair has a partnership with Plymouth County Extension 4-H offering space at the fairgrounds for a variety of Plymouth County Extension 4-H programming. Plymouth County Extension 4-H holds educational 4-H animal programs each

July and August at the Fairgrounds. In addition, the Marshfield Fair is the premier event for Plymouth County 4-H'ers, as it provides the opportunity to exhibit showmanship skills and the importance of agriculture, during various animal shows during the fair. Over 200 youth participate at the Marshfield Fair from all of Plymouth County. New for FY 16 was a 4-H equine program at the Marshfield Fair allowing for expanded demonstrations and shows for 4-H with equine projects.

- The Plymouth County Extension 4-H Teen Program offers a range of opportunities for teenagers focusing on leadership, communications, career preparation, and community service. 4-H teen programs include, planning and running and participating in the 4-H/FFA Teen Leadership Camp, and participating in the National 4-H Congress and National 4-H Conference. 4-H teens are also invited annually to participate in Agriculture Day at the State House in Boston. All youth who attend visit with local legislators while at the Statehouse and participate in a leadership and citizenship program to teach democracy. 4-H Ambassadors, are teens who meet regularly year round and also serve on Advisory Boards for the Extension Office so that youth can give input to county programming. Plymouth County 4-H teens also helped plan and implement the second and third 4-H Teen Leadership Camp for Massachusetts 4-H which was held this past April and October in Ashland, MA. Due to the continued success for this 4-H Leadership program funding has been secured for this annual event.

The Plymouth County 4-H program is guided by the involvement of three volunteer advisory groups comprised of Plymouth County volunteers. All three councils receive oversight and board training through the Plymouth County Extension 4-H office.

FIRE, RESCUE AND EMERGENCY SERVICES REPORT 2016

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Whitman:

I am pleased to submit the Annual Report of the Whitman Fire Rescue and Emergency Services Department for calendar year 2016. Emergency responses for 2016 were 2,664. Fire prevention education was provided to hundreds of children and adults. Fire personnel recorded over 500 individual training hours, ensuring the most efficient, effective service possible.

Our customers are the priority and your opinion is our driving force. The modifications we made to our operations has provided our customers with national standards as it relates to patient care for the first call. We strive to put an emergency responder at every incident within 4 minutes of your call. Our call volume is increasing and with only five members per shift and an increase in call volume of 177% since 1973, it is close to impossible to reach that standard. Our staffing levels allow us prompt and adequate staffing for the first emergency call. The second and subsequent calls are severely affected now due to lack of adequate staffing.

Your Fire Department is comprised of highly skilled, kindhearted problem solvers, who are committed to providing the best care and customer service possible during often difficult circumstances. We are your emergency service department and available 24 hours a day, seven days a week simply by dialing 911.

Fire/Rescue service is an evolving operation with changes daily to fire scene operations, emergency medical treatments and training requirements. Many are non-funded mandates from the State or other agencies. Training to meet required State and Federal standards are a challenge, particularly finding the time and money to conduct the training. The members of this Department are constantly challenged to find ways to do more with less, yet we take great pride and satisfaction in providing essential fire, rescue and emergency services to the citizens of the Town of Whitman.

During the year the department responded to a total of 2,664 emergency calls. A breakdown of these incidents shows 1,587 were for emergency medical with 1,077 for fire/hazardous conditions, false alarms, good intent calls, service calls, motor vehicle accidents and other areas of service. There has been a steady trend since 2005 where Fire incidents have closed in on EMS incidents in relation to percentage of calls.

The Holbrook Regional Communications Center continues to provide primary 911 answering with emergency medical dispatch, which is providing lifesaving instructions over the phone when required. This system has proven itself time and time again by providing instructions over the phone to bystanders for CPR. Additionally, it allows us the flexibility of taking all five on duty members to an emergency while Holbrook Dispatches the incident.

Currently we staff three ambulances:

Ambulance 247 – 2012 Life Line - Paramedic staffed with on duty members.

Ambulance 248 – 2009 Life Line – Paramedic staffed with on duty members.

Ambulance 249 – New Ambulance which will be placed into service this March.

With the arrival of our new pumping Engine, we were able to license it as a Class 5 Ambulance. Now, Firefighter/Paramedics assigned to the truck have all their Advanced Life Support equipment with them at all times. This allows for rapid patient care at the ALS level when the Engine is first on scene. This was demonstrated during the first couple of weeks it was in service. While operating at a seven alarm fire in Brockton, one of our members experienced a cardiac event. Members were able to begin immediate care at the ALS level, while they awaited an ambulance.

Firefighter Tom Ford, the Towns SAFE Officer, conducted countless hours of education to our children in the school system. Additionally the senior population were educated during coffee hours and those who participated in our smoke detector program received new smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Deputy Fire Chief Joe Feeney conducted several hundred inspections related to fire prevention. Deputy Feeney works hand in hand with our Building Commissioner making Whitman a safer community for all of us.

Firefighter Paramedic Matt Busch, the Departments EMS Officer, continues to command an EMS Operation viewed as the best system in the area. FF Busch works tirelessly with our membership providing education and training. Additionally he works closely with our Medical Director, Dr. Dan Muse in assuring our members are the best in the business. The demands placed on EMS Agencies is so stringent, it actually requires a fulltime position for EMS Oversight.

Firefighter Pat Travers is our regional member on the Plymouth County Technical Rescue Team. FF Travers has extensive training in special operation situations such as trench collapse, high angle rescue, confined space and dive and water operations, along with other topics. The Technical Rescue Team is a County asset which is made up of Firefighters across the County with this specialized training, ready to be deployed at a moment's notice.

Fire Lieutenant Robert Hover was assigned as our IT person and has spent endless hours developing our Computer Aided Dispatch system tied to the Regional Dispatch Center which now provides endless data to our members in the field.

The department also detailed firefighters and emergency medical technicians where required for fire safety watches, welding and cutting operations, athletic competitions, health-fairs, and public speaking engagements.

I would like to thank the Fire Officers, Firefighters, and my Administrative Assistant Lisa Riley for assisting me in the operation of this Department, the Board of Selectmen, Town Administrator and all Town Departments and Committees for their help and guidance throughout the year. I also want to thank Chief Scott Benton and the members of the Police Department for their dedicated service. You can be assured that the men and women of Whitman Fire-Rescue and Emergency Services will continue to serve the people of this Town and strive to keep it a safe place to live and work.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Whitman:

In compliance with the General Laws of Massachusetts, we herewith submit our report for the year 2016.

At the Annual Town Election in May, Mary Kelly was elected to the Board for a 1 year term and Eric F. Joubert was re-elected for a 3 year term. During the reorganization of the Board of Health at their meeting on May 31, 2016, Eric F. Joubert was elected Chair, Mary Kelly as Clerk and Barbara J. White as Vice Chair.

In February, the Board of Health appointed Alexis Andrews as Health Inspector. Alexis has a solid knowledge of food service and housing and has extensive experience working with public. She has acclimated well to her position and has made many positive improvements in keeping the Board of Health prepared and informed to handle an emergency in the event that Whitman's Emergency Dispensing Site is activated. The Infectious Disease Emergency Plan including an Emergency Dispensing Site Plan is currently under review/update in conjunction with the Regional Planner, Department of Public Health, and Whitman's Emergency Management Director and is expected to be completed in 2017.

The Health Inspector and Assistant Health Inspector investigate all complaints received through the Board of Health office. The Board is pleased to report that all food establishments and public schools are being inspected. The office has transitioned from paper recording of investigations and complaints to electronic record keeping using a program

from Commonwealth Connect. This improvement has provided positive results for the office.

Norwell VNA and Hospice was contracted by the Board of Health to provide Whitman's public health services for July 2016 – June 2017. Norwell VNA handles all follow-up for Whitman's communicable disease, holds various wellness clinics each month and presents wellness programs under the direction of the Board of Health. Please follow us on the Board of Health's website for wellness clinic times and programs offered.

Chapter 141, Sections 145B of the MA General Laws requires that all dogs and cats in Massachusetts be vaccinated against rabies. The Board holds its annual rabies clinic with Abington Animal Hospital offering low cost rabies vaccine for cats and dogs in the Spring. Because of the constant presence of rabies in raccoons and bats in Massachusetts the Board strongly encourages residents to use extreme caution when dealing with wild animals and when treating domestic animals with a wound of unknown origin.

As of December 31, 2016, 3,441 on-site septic systems have been rendered permanently useless when the site was connected to municipal sewer thus eliminating potentially hazardous conditions.

Money is available in the form of a low interest rate loan to property owners to connect to municipal sewer. Further information may be obtained by contacting the Board of Health office.

On September 17, 2016, the Board along with the Towns of Abington and Hanson held its annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day. Many Whitman residents took advantage of disposing of hazardous waste properly. Look for the 2017 Household Hazardous Waste Collection event on our website. Please remember if you are unable to attend our town's event you can contact the Board of Health's office to obtain a visitor pass to attend a South Shore Recycling Cooperative collection in another town.

The Board continues to offer a program for the collection of used syringes for Whitman residents at no charge. Please visit the Board of Health's website for details. Throughout the year, expired or unused medication should be brought to the Whitman Police Station and dropped in the secure box located in the lobby. Ni-cd (rechargeable) batteries should be brought to the Board's office for disposal during regular office hours. Items containing mercury such as thermometers, light bulbs, and thermostats should be recycled at the DPW yard.

The Board continues to work in cooperation with all town departments to ensure a safe healthy environment for all citizens of the Town of Whitman. Continue to follow us at www.whitman-ma.gov for current information/updates.

REPORT OF THE WHITMAN HOUSING AUTHORITY

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Whitman:

Regular meetings of the Whitman Housing Authority are held on the second Monday of each month at 7:00 p.m. in the community building at Harvard Court. All meetings are open to the public and any interested citizen is welcome to attend. Special meetings are scheduled when necessary. All meetings are posted with the Town Clerk.

The Housing Authority's office is located at the Harvard Court Development and is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The Board of Commissioners consists of four elected Whitman residents and one resident who is state appointed by the Governor. The authority has five full-time employees and three part-time employees. Housing staff and Board members attend Spring and Fall MassNAHRO Conferences and Legislative Day at the State House. Staff members also attend various workshops and association meetings throughout the year.

Under the Department of Housing and Community Development's Incentive Program, the Whitman Housing Authority is rated with "acceptable performance," which maintains the highest rating given by D.H.C.D. The Authority manages 195 units of housing within the Town of Whitman. There are forty (40) units at Stetson Terrace, eighty (80) units at Harvard Court, forty-four (44) units at Pine Circle and eighteen (18) family units under the 705 Program. Also included is twelve certificates under the Alternative Rental Voucher Program and one under the Massachusetts Rental Voucher Program. In total, eleven (11) units are handicap accessible.

The Whitman Housing Authority continues to renovate units and improve the grounds of each development to maintain safe, affordable and clean housing for all tenants. All units are inspected annually by the Director and authority staff. Modernization projects completed in 2016 include paving and site improvements at the Pine Circle complex and numerous projects and updates to the family housing programs.

Tenant rent is re-determined on an annual basis according to current income, assets and medical expenses. Anyone who wishes to apply for housing can call 781-447-6363 and an application will be provided. You may also find applications on our website at www.whitmanhousing.com.

Transportation is provided on Friday's for grocery shopping and to various town events throughout the year. Tenant managed Senior Bingo is played on Wednesdays and exercise class is held on Thursdays in the Harvard Court community room. A social worker is available for all tenants on Tuesdays, by appointment. Tenants are also encouraged to hold social events in the community rooms of their developments.

Special thanks and appreciation to the Whitman Fire and Police Departments for their assistance and compassion shown to the residents in times of need. To the Council on Aging, as well as other local service agencies and volunteers, much thanks for your help and assistance. To Senator, Michael Brady and State Representative, Geoffrey Diehl, thanks for your dedication and support in preserving and modernizing public housing.

2016 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

To The Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Whitman:

The Whitman Public Library has completed another successful and productive year. Detailed statistics collected through the Old Colony Library Network (OCLN) provide data enabling the Director and Trustees to offer relevant programs and materials to the 7,431 residents with library cards, their children, and other community members. 82,653 patrons visited our extremely busy and robust library. One out of every two Whitman residents choose to hold library cards and have borrowed materials within the past twenty four months. The average patron borrowed 13 items each year. Circulation figures remain strong with 88,968 items being borrowed from our collection. Providing high quality early literacy programming is paramount to the mission of the library as countless studies have shown a correlation with early exposure to books and an increased rate of literacy. We are pleased to report that 3,679 children visited us for 207 story times, book clubs and various other enrichment programs in 2016.

We were pleased to offer adults 77 programs here at the library including educational enrichment programs, book discussions, author presentations and film screenings. Our Local Author Series was a great success drawing over 100 attendees to support the fine work of Massachusetts and Whitman writers and artists. The library also increased programming specifically targeting the adult learner, providing instruction courses on emerging technologies and basic computer skills. In response to overwhelming demand from the public, the library increased program offerings for both adults and youth this year. The library's programming for children, especially during the annual Summer Reading Program, continued to grow with 425 children and teens participating in the program.

This year the library was awarded several grants for adults and children. One of the largest grants was provided by the Massachusetts Center for the Humanities. This \$3,000.00 grant allowed the library to host a 6 week book discussion series on diversity and inclusion for children. We were also able to supplement our collection with a rich new array of resources on this topic. Additional grants were awarded by the Easton Children's Museum and the Massachusetts Cultural Council, for which the library community is deeply grateful.

The library was the beneficiary of a substantial bequest from the estate of Bruno Guerra. Mr. Guerra was a long time library patron who would walk from his home in Hanson to our library almost daily. He used the resources at the library, particularly the newspapers to inform his investment decisions. His tremendous gift to the library of over \$350,000.00 will allow us to modernize our technology infrastructure and improve our physical facility great-

ly. We are touched and honored that the Whitman Public Library impacted Mr. Guerra's life in such a profound way and that we were so prominently remembered by his estate.

The Adult Services and Children's librarians have used best practices and professional standards to improve the scope and quality of the collection, and to modernize our print and electronic offerings reflecting current trends. Circulation figures remain strong with over 88,000 items being borrowed from our collection. The largest increases in circulation were noted in our E-book collections with digital materials being checked out 17,403 times this year.

The library continues to act as a community meeting place for the residents of Whitman. This year our community room facilities were reserved over 549 times by community groups to engage in civic and cultural endeavors. The recently renovated library foyer included an expanded community notice section which has proved to be an invaluable resource for disseminating information throughout the community.

The library's website is constantly being updated and much information can be obtained there about programming, ongoing projects, policies and reservation information on programs and use of community room. The Long-Range Plan is also posted on the website. Outreach in other digital forms including Facebook and Twitter also connect patrons to library services.

The Whitman Public Library remains committed to connecting all residents to free and reliable high speed internet access. Our 13 public computer terminals saw an average of 221 users per week. Access to free wireless internet in the library continues to increase, with more patrons using the service than ever before. To this end the library has begun offering Wireless Hot Spot routers to our patrons. These devices allow patrons to "borrow the internet" for a one week period. Connecting patrons to information is central to the mission of the public library, and we have seen an overwhelming response to the addition of Wireless Hot Spots to our collection. This is evidenced by the many letters of support from the community to this pilot program and by the incredible circulation figures for these items which have been checked out continuously since their launch and have a substantial waiting list.

In today's increasingly digitally-connected world, it is essential that all patrons not only have access to the internet, but have the skills to navigate it. We remain committed to helping ensure that all of our students, job seekers, and the general public are digitally literate. We offer immediate computer assistance to all patrons and offer one-on-one training sessions for those looking for more in-depth instruction. The library staff provides reference help to any user who requires information, performing 6,132 reference transactions over the course of the year. For the convenience of our patrons reference assistance may be provided on site, over the phone, or via email at info@whitmanpubliclibrary.org.

The Whitman Public Library continues to be the only place in the community that provides IRS tax forms, and, as more government forms have become accessible only through the internet, the library is the main location for citizens to obtain such information if they do not have internet access at home. Increasingly, the library offers resources to connect patrons with government services.

The library continues to work with our community schools during the year with homework help, purchase of databases and other materials, and computer access. Our annual Summer Reading Program encourages students to keep up with their reading, and the library purchases multiple copies of books assigned by the schools for summer reading homework.

For patrons unable to visit the library in person due to physical limitations, the Whitman Public Library offers "Library To Go", a free delivery service to homebound Whitman residents, regardless of age. Those with temporary disabilities (such as a broken leg, pregnancy or recovery from surgery) are also eligible. Patrons may call the library to register for weekly deliveries of books, movies, music CDs and audiobooks of their choosing. Those not sure of what they want can discuss preferences with the staff, who will select materials for them. This service is provided by a volunteer who delivers and picks up the books each week.

Andrea Rounds continues to oversee the operations of the library in her capacity as Director and the Board of Library Trustees looks forward to many years of her service to the townspeople of Whitman. Marcie Walsh-O'Connor serves as Assistant Director and Adult Services Librarian and continues to revitalize and invigorate the physical collection, as well as improve programming and instruction services for adults. Stephanie Young, Youth Services Librarian, continues to focus on early literacy, engaging the children of Whitman in educational endeavors that will equip them with the skills needed as they grow up in our digitally-literate economy. Library staff members continue to develop new skills and improve library service by attending workshops, trainings and discussion groups. These sessions include such varied topics as collection development, new reference resources, technology training and programming ideas for children and adults.

Volunteers and Senior Tax Abatement workers continue to assist library staff with a variety of tasks such as phone calls, shelving books and book repair, as well as many other behind-the-scenes tasks. Their collective contribution of over 1,500 hours each year is acknowledged and honored by staff and Trustees with an annual reception in April. The service of all these volunteers is greatly appreciated.

The Friends of the Library continue to provide major support for library projects and children's programming. They fund both adult and children's programming and assist in purchasing materials and equipment for the library. Because of their generosity, the library was able to offer many children's events throughout the year, as well as several young adult and adult programs. They raise money by holding twice-yearly book-bake-and boutique sales in spring and fall. They also offer an ongoing book sale in the library, as well as other fundraising projects. A Friends newsletter is distributed periodically and is available at the library for interested patrons.

Trustee Chair Susan Durand serves the greater library community as a member of the Massachusetts Library Trustees Association, a statewide organization of trustees, librarians, and friends of public libraries. The Director, staff members, Trustees and Friends also attend the annual Library Legislative Breakfast hosted by the Massachusetts Library System and the Old Colony Library Network to generate interest and support for budget initiatives presented for state funding by the Board of Library Commissioners.

The Trustees, Director, and staff of the Library are committed to maintaining exceptional service to the community while constantly striving to improve their offerings in every way possible. Trustees, Director and staff continue to provide townspeople with the very best library facilities, services and programming possible at the most reasonable cost.

REPORT OF PLYMOUTH COUNTY MOSQUITO CONTROL PROJECT

The Commissioners of the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project are pleased to submit the following report of our activities during 2016.

The Project is a special district created by the State Legislature in 1957, and is now composed of all Plymouth County towns, the City of Brockton, and the town of Cohasset in Norfolk County. The Project is a regional response to a regional problem, and provides a way of organizing specialized equipment, specially trained employees, and mosquito control professionals into a single agency with a broad geographical area of responsibility.

The 2016 season began dry with a low water table, dry conditions increased into the summer season. Efforts were directed at larval mosquitoes starting with the spring brood. We ground larvicided 4,600 acres and aerial larvicided 15,432 acres and this was accomplished using B.t.i., an environmentally selective bacterial agent. Upon emergence of the spring brood of mosquitoes, ultra-low volume adulticiding began on June 1, 2016 and ended on September 9, 2016. The Project responded to 13,775 requests for spraying and larval checks from residents covering all of the towns within the district.

In response to the continued threat of mosquito borne diseases in the district, we increased our surveillance trapping, aerial and ground larviciding, and adult spray in areas of concern to protect public health.

Massachusetts Department of Public Health has developed an "Arbovirus Surveillance and Response Plan" for the state. The Plan creates a system which estimates the human risk for contracting Eastern Equine Encephalitis and West Nile using several factors including the number of infected mosquitoes. Based on guidelines defined by the Plan, all towns in Plymouth County Mosquito Project were at the "Low Level Risk" for Eastern Equine Encephalitis. We are pleased to report that in 2016 there were no human, or horse EEE cases in the district. There were 3 pools of mosquitoes found to be infected with EEEV. They were in the following towns: Kingston, Middleboro, and West Bridgewater.

West Nile Virus was not found within the district. All towns within the district remained at the "Low Level Risk" category for West Nile Virus. We are also pleased to report that in 2016 that there were no human or horse West Nile Virus cases in Plymouth County Mosquito Control district. As part of our West Nile Virus control strategy a total of 47,391 catch basins were treated with larvicide in all of our towns to prevent WNV.

The Health threat of EEE and WNV continues to ensure cooperation between the Plymouth County Mosquito Control Project, local Boards of Health and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health. In an effort to keep the public informed, EEE and WNV activity updates are regularly posted on Massachusetts Department of Public Health website.

In conjunction with the MDPH we began a trapping program to monitor *Aedes albopictus* expansion in the state. *Ae. albopictus* is an introduced mosquito that has the potential to become a serious pest and a vector of disease. The mosquito has been present in the Massachusetts since 2009. The larvae live in containers and are closely linked with human activity. They are especially associated with used tires. In mid-summer the mosquito was detected in the District for the first time. We think the population is small, but expect the mosquito to spread. As a result, we plan to expand our *Ae. albopictus* surveillance program.

The figures specific to the town of Whitman are given below. While mosquitoes do not respect town lines the information given below does provide a tally of the activities which have had the greatest impact on the health and comfort of Whitman residents.

Insecticide Applications: Our greatest effort has been targeted at mosquitoes in the larval stage, which can be found in woodland pools, swamps, marshes and other standing water areas. Inspectors continually gather data on these sites and treat with highly specific larvicides when immature mosquitoes are present. In Whitman 87 larval sites were checked.

During the summer 1197 catch basins were treated in Whitman to prevent the emergence of *Culex pipiens*, a known mosquito vector in West Nile Virus transmission.

Our staff treated 561 acres using truck mounted sprayers for control of adult mosquitoes. More than one application was made to the same site if mosquitoes reinvaded the area. The first treatments were made in June and the last in September.

Water Management: During 2016 crews removed blockages, brush and other obstructions from 1150 linear feet of ditches and streams to prevent overflows or stagnation that can result in mosquito production. This work, together with machine reclamation, is most often carried out in the fall and winter.

Mosquito Survey: Our surveillance showed that the dominant mosquitoes throughout the district were generally *Coquillettidia perturbans* and *Culex pipiens/restuans*. In the Town of Whitman the three most common mosquitoes were *Cq. perturbans*, *Culex pipiens/restuans* and *Oc. canadensis*.

TOWN OF WHITMAN DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Town of Whitman Department of Public Works respectfully submits the 68th Annual Town Report to the Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Whitman.

Highway, Maintenance and Park & Tree Department

In Fiscal year 2016, the Department of Public Works Highway, Park and Tree divisions spent most of the summer of 2015 working in the Town Park to better accommodate visitors with accessibility issues. Some of this work included the removal of the existing gravel on the pathways and replacing it with a more suitable material, allowing easier travel for wheelchairs, etc. Other upgrades included installing rubber pathways and new wood chips in the playground area, concrete pathways to the picnic area, upgraded railings on the Bandstand and handicap ramps at all corners of the park.

In addition to this work, the Bandstand was completely repainted and the park pond was drained to enable our crews to dredge the bottom of leaves and silty materials.

Our annual Chapter 90 funded road improvement projects included repaving Beaver Street, Regal Street, Washington Street (north) and the purchase and installation of the new four-way flashing light at the intersection of Franklin Street and South Avenue.

Along with the routine work of mowing and trimming our Town fields, beautification of all Town building grounds, rotary and cemeteries, street sweeping, painting, drainage repair and maintenance, our crews also performed other notable projects such as installing the new traffic island at the Franklin Street and South Avenue intersection, painting the Memorial Field bleachers and repaving the Park Avenue sidewalk, to name a few.

The Maintenance Division continues to do an outstanding job maintaining and repairing an aging fleet of trucks and equipment that in some cases are approaching twenty years old.

The winter of 2015/16 was considered to be meteorologically average as the Town saw approximately 51 inches of snowfall. As a result, the Public Works crews performed 26 road salting operations, spreading 1,618 tons of salt in the process. The winter also required 7 full snowplowing operations - utilizing all Public Works employees along with 17 hired private contractors.

The total Snow and Ice control expenditure for this winter was \$283,798.00

In the spring of 2016, the Town implemented the new Solid Waste and Recycling pickup program. This program utilizes wheeled 64 gallon carts that are emptied into trucks using mechanical arms. This program, although not without some growing pains and as with anything new, has been very successful by limiting the amount of blowing trash and has also reduced our solid waste disposal tonnage by 20-30 tons per month. This reduction not only helps maintain our current fees, but just as importantly reduces the amount of solid waste going into our landfills or being incinerated.

Water & Sewer Department

In Fiscal Year 2016, water samples were taken and tested daily to ensure that the water our Town residents drink is safe. Water meters are read twice a year, and we continue to replace old meters throughout the Town.

Fire Hydrants were flushed and winterized to prevent freezing. Leak detection was performed to minimize unaccounted for water.

We continually answer daily service calls, respond to water leak repairs, inspect and maintain seventeen (17) sewer stations on a twenty-four (24) hour basis.

The Water Main Replacement Project is ongoing. New water mains on South Avenue, Sportsmen's Trail and the Bedford Street meter pit have been completed.

We would like to take this opportunity to publicly thank our employees for their devotion to duty and the outstanding work that they perform throughout the year.

We also thank the Town boards for their assistance in accomplishing our goals over the past year.

We close this report as we have done before by stating we are ever ready to aid the citizens of Whitman within the Town By-Laws and the Department of Public Works Rules and Regulations.

REPORT OF THE OLD COLONY PLANNING COUNCIL

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Whitman:

As your representatives to the Old Colony Planning Council (OCPC), we are pleased to present this report on behalf of the Council for 2016.

The Old Colony Planning Council was established in 1967 by state statute and is authorized to prepare plans for the physical, social and economic development of the seventeen-member community region. OCPC is designated as: an Economic Development District by the U.S. Department of Commerce for the coordination of regional economic development activities; an Area Agency on Aging (AAA) by the Executive Office of Elder Affairs to plan, manage and coordinate elder services in a twenty-three community service area; and, the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) to plan and program transportation and transit improvements for the region.

In addition to the above-designated responsibilities, the Council also assists its member municipalities with technical planning, grant application preparation and current local and regional socioeconomic information.

During the past year, the Council completed the 2016 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) Plan; the 2016 Old Colony Regional Transportation Plan; the

FFY 2017-2021 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); the Brockton Area Transit Comprehensive Regional Transit Plan; the Plymouth Special Events Traffic Analysis and Management Plan; the FFY 2017 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP); and provided numerous Road Safety Audits, Intersection Analyses, and Transportation Technical Studies to the member communities; and, continued participation in the South Coast Commuter Rail Task Force. The Council also provided technical assistance to member communities under the District Local Technical Assistance (DLTA) Program. The DLTA funding was used in such areas as regionalization, including aggregation of electricity, the investigation of water and wastewater, as well as conducting a number of land use analyses, neighborhood economic and transportation analyses. The Council also provided assistance to Plymouth on the Decommissioning of the Nuclear Power Plant, assistance to municipalities in the development of Business Councils and Site finder, and provided a variety of economic development technical assistance as well as Green Communities Designation. The Old Colony Area Agency on Aging (AAA) during the past year, with assistance and guidance from member community advisory committee members, has continued the ongoing administration of over \$1.3 million dollars of Federal and State funding for elder services. The OCPC-AAA administers and oversees funding for services like nutrition, transportation, day care, legal services, and others to the more than 96,000 persons age 60 and over in the region. The OCPC-AAA continues to advocate on behalf of older persons from throughout the region. The OCPC-AAA Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program continues its efforts, with over 1,350 visits to nursing and rest homes, investigating over 300 issues of concern from residents or families. In Addition, OCPC continues to administer the Septic Loan Program for the Towns of Avon, Cohasset, Hanson, Kingston and Stoughton. During 2016, the Council processed approximately \$361,000 in loans for both septic systems and sewer connection for the communities under the Septic Loan Program.

One delegate and one alternate member represent each member community of the Council. The Council members establish policy, develop the work program, and employ and oversee the activities of the professional staff. The Council meets on the last Wednesday of each month at 7:00 PM in the OCPC offices located at 70 School Street, Brockton, MA. In 2016, the Council elected Frank P. Staffier, of Avon as Council President; Christine Joy, of Plympton as Council Treasurer; and, Fred L. Gilmetti, of Whitman as Council Secretary. Pasquale Ciaramella serves as Executive Director of the Council.

The Council gratefully acknowledges the generous support and cooperation of its member communities and the participation and involvement of the many individuals who participate as members of committees. Special thanks are extended to the Joint Transportation Committee Chair Noreen O'Toole; Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy Committee Chair Mary Waldron; and, the Area Agency on Aging Advisory Committee Chair Anna L. Seery for their commitment, dedication and leadership during the past year. The Council also recognizes the work of local boards and commissions and the government agencies, public and private institutions and individuals who assisted the Council in its efforts.

NVNA and Hospice is the only Massachusetts agency to be named a Home Care Elite Top Agency in the United States for ten consecutive years, this year selected in the **Top 100**. Our contract began July 1, 2012 with the Whitman Board of Health for our staff to provide nursing services: offering public health screenings and health education free to the residents of the town. We currently have office hours weekly in the Town Hall, and monthly BP clinics at the Senior Center and Harvard Court.

REPORT OF THE WHITMAN POLICE DEPARTMENT

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Whitman:

I am pleased to submit the Whitman Police Department's Annual Town Report for 2016.

The year 2016 saw acts of worldwide and domestic terrorism that continues to occupy a great amount of resources and time of our government, military and law enforcement. Worldwide terror attacks in Berlin, Istanbul and Brussels caused death and carnage to many innocent people. Here at home the Orlando night club mass shooting that resulted in forty-nine people killed was the deadliest in U.S. history. As a country we continue to deal with these acts of violence that leave us in a state of anxiety over when and where the next incident will occur. This is challenging for law enforcement officials who have the responsibility of protecting everyone from harm and reassuring citizens that they are safe. Our department continues to receive training in the areas of global and domestic terrorism.

Officer fatalities nationwide in 2016 rose to their highest level in five years, with 135 officers killed in the line of duty. Firearms were the number one cause of death with 64 officers shot and killed across the country. Of the 64 deaths, 21 were the result of ambush-style attacks. This is the highest total in more than two decades. Eight multiple-shooting death incidents claimed the lives of 20 officers in 2016, this tied 1971 for the highest total of any year since 1932.

As Police Officers, we are sworn to protect all citizens. We seek out the people who commit all types of crimes and prey on our citizens. It is a new time in our country for people to be very concerned with the way that law enforcement is being treated. When people who are charged with the responsibility of hunting the bad people, become the hunted, the result cannot be good for any of us. It is my hope that we can all come together and work as one to address the issues and become stronger as a nation.

The presidential election in November 2016 contained ballot question number four, a vote to legalize marijuana. The voters of Massachusetts voted Yes - 53.6% (1,745,945), No - 46.4% (1,513,304). The Town of Whitman voted Yes-4,340 and No-3,634. This will create many challenges for law enforcement that could take years to resolve. The people have spoken and even though we may not agree, we as a state and those of us in law enforcement will need to learn to accept and deal with this issue.

We as a country, state and community continue to deal with the opioid epidemic. Public health officials have called the current opioid epidemic the worst drug crisis in U.S. history, killing more than 33,000 people in 2015. We continue to work with the Brockton Mayor's Opioid Overdose Prevention Coalition, Whitman Hanson WILL Coalition, Plymouth County Project Outreach and EB Hope. We had Forty-one overdoses in 2016, six less than the forty-seven we had in 2015. Of the forty-one overdoses, three resulted in death, down from nine deaths that we had in 2015.

The Whitman Police Department has continued its partnership with the WEB Task Force and we continue to benefit from this partnership. Utilizing the WEB Task Force we are able to call upon personnel and equipment at a minimal cost. The WEB Task Force investigates illegal narcotics, property crimes and any other crimes that cannot be completed by the officer on the street. This is very cost effective for the communities that join, and in times of budget cuts it makes great sense. We have three members that serve on the

WEB Task Force, Sergeant Detective Joseph Bombardier, Detective Eric Campbell and Detective Peter Aitken.

We have also continued our partnership with S.E.M.L.E.C. (Southeastern Massachusetts Law Enforcement Council). This includes twenty-seven southeastern municipal police departments and provides a number of services that are instrumental in the fight against crime. S.E.M.L.E.C. has a Search and Rescue Team, a Rapid Response/S.W.A.T Team, a Marine Unit and Dive Team, a Critical Incident Stress Team and a Motorcycle M.O.P. (Mobil Operation Patrol) Team. We have two members assigned to the S.A.R. Team, Officer David Hickey and Officer Kevin Shanteler. Three of our members are assigned to the Rapid Response/S.W.A.T. Team, Sergeant Andrew Stafford, Sergeant Matthew Kenealy and Officer Paul Young. One member assigned to the CIS Team, Officer Kevin Harrington and one member assigned to the Motorcycle M.O.P. (Mobil Operations Patrol) Team, Lieutenant Daniel Connolly. All of our specialty units train a minimum of eight hours a month as well as maintaining their fitness for their position.

Officer Kevin Harrington continues to instruct the D.A.R.E Program. Officer Harrington teaches a prescribed curriculum to grades K-8. He also assists the Hanson D.A.R.E./SRO officer at the high school with incidents that may arise. Officer Harrington is a constant presence at school events and activities. His dedication and commitment to the students in our community is to be admired and appreciated by all.

Members of the police department receive annual in-service training each year. This year the training focused on CPR/AED and First Responder, Effective Interventions with People that Suffer from Alzheimer's and Dementia, Legal Updates, Dynamics of Addiction, Effective Police Interaction with Youths, Defensive Tactics and Active Shooter. In addition to annual in-service training, specialized training occurred. This training was in areas such as Advanced OUI Clinic, New England Law Enforcement Executive Development Training Seminar hosted by the FBI, Matron Training, Command Staff Training, Public Records Law Training, Taser Instructor Recertification, Internal Affairs Investigations, AR-15/M16 Armorers Course, Advanced Armorers Course, Field Training Officer Program, Public Safety in Local Leadership for Public Safety and Community Challenges and Multi-Hazard Emergency Planning In Schools Training.

Sergeant Sean Reynolds retired on June 23, 2016 and Sergeant Matthew Kenealy replaced Sergeant Reynolds as the Whitman Police Prosecutor.

Officer Justin Burns was hired as a lateral transfer in November to fill the vacancy created by Sergeant Reynolds retirement.

The Whitman Auxiliary Police Unit volunteers thousands of hours each year to the Town of Whitman. They provide coverage that supplements the police department for events such as parades, storm coverage, special events and many others. I want to express my deepest gratitude for the dedication and service that these men and women provide to the Town of Whitman. I especially wish to express my sincere gratitude, admiration and respect to Officer John Cannizzo for his dedication, professionalism and loyalty in leading the Auxiliary Police Department.

I wish to extend my sincere appreciation to our Animal Control Officer Lisa McKay for her professionalism and dedication to her duties. She is very knowledgeable and does an outstanding job maintaining the animal shelter as well as attending to the town's displaced animals.

I want to extend my gratitude to the Crossing Guards who are out in all types of weather ensuring that all children are able to get back and forth to school safely.

I want to thank the DPW for the countless hours and tireless work that they put into maintaining the Whitman Police Department grounds. They do an outstanding job and are always there when we need them.

To Whitman Fire and Rescue Chief Timothy Grenno, who I work closely with throughout the year on public safety issues, I want to express my sincere gratitude. His wisdom, dedication, and guidance make working with him a true pleasure.

I would like to thank all of the men and women of the Whitman Police Department for their dedication, professionalism, and assistance in helping me carry out the operations of the Whitman Police Department.

I would also like to thank the members of Whitman Fire and Rescue for their dedication and team work with regard to assisting us with calls for service.

I have tremendous gratitude, respect and admiration for Deputy Chief Timothy Hanlon, Special Officer and Matron Joyce Gunter and Records Clerk Tracy Briggs for their dedication, professionalism and loyalty. Their commitment and hard work are an integral component that contributes to the efficient and effective running of the Whitman Police Department.

I could never fully express how invaluable my Administrative Assistant Katrina Patton is to the Whitman Police Department. Her dedication, professionalism, commitment and loyalty are unparalleled. Just her presence truly makes every day better than the last for all of us.

I would like to thank The Board of Selectmen, Town Administrator Francis Lynam, Assistant Town Administrator Lisa Green, Town Administrative Assistant Laurie O'Brien, DPW Superintendent Bruce Martin, The Finance Committee and all other Town Departments, Boards and Committees that have provided me with guidance and counsel throughout the year.

The Recreation Commission serves the community by organizing recreational programs, activities, and events as well as scheduling the use of the town athletic fields and facilities including the Whitman Middle and Conley School Fields, World War 2 Memorial Field, Town Park and Lower Park Fields.

Family and friends shared July 4th festivities at our 48th Annual Family Fun Day at the Whitman Town Park along with a 5K Road Race. Third-Party Credentials

Students at SSVT have opportunities to earn industry recognized credentials that give them a competitive advantage as they head into the workforce. Such credentials include OSHA 10-Hour General and Construction Certification, ServSafe Sanitation, Certified Nursing Assistant, CPR, First Aid, Home Health Aide, Feeding Assistant, Microsoft Professional Tech Associate, Cosmetology State Board Licensure, PIC Soldering Certification, Print Ed, EPA401 Certification (HVAC), American Welding Society Certification, and MACWIC (Machine).

Community Projects

South Shore Vocational Technical High School supplies services to our communities and their residents at a discounted rate. Besides completing a number of projects for individual residences in Whitman during the past calendar year, the students of South Shore are working with the Whitman Public Library on a number of requests they have made for our services. The school supplies services in carpentry, metal fabrication, automotive and collision repair technology, heating and air conditioning as well as your graphic printing needs. We also run a full service beauty salon and restaurant which are open to the public Tuesday thru Friday each week when school is in session. We look forward to continuing to provide services for the Town of Whitman and its residents for years to come. Please utilize the school's website, www.ssvotech.org, to request work or stop by the salon or restaurant at your convenience.

Cooperative Education

The Cooperative Education program, designed for vocational technical students, provides an opportunity for students who, through a cooperative arrangement between the school and employers, receive instruction, including required academic courses and related vocational instruction, with a job in his or her specific occupational field. This instruction is planned and supervised by the school and the employer so that each contributes to the student's education and employability. For students at South Shore Vocational Technical High School, work periods and school attendance are on alternating 5 day cycles. All senior students in good standing are eligible to participate in the Cooperative Education program at South Shore.

Student Organizations

The Student Council at South Shore promotes communication between the school administration and the student body. Leading by example, the members of the student council promote student leadership, democratic decision making, and student body engagement. In addition to student led activities and volunteer work, student council officers also represent the student body on the School Council and at School Committee meetings.

South Shore students also participate in national co-curricular student organizations. SkillsUSA and Business Professionals of America provide educational and leadership activities for students which are designed to build leadership, teamwork, citizenship, and character development. Through a carefully designed curriculum and opportunities for competition at the district, state, and national level, students build and reinforce self-

confidence, work attitudes, and communication skills. Co-curricular organizations emphasize total quality of work, high ethical standards, superior work skills, life-long education and pride in the dignity of work.

Planning for the Future

In an effort to stay on top of facility's needs, we have submitted a second application to the MSBA's CORE program. We believe that SSVT needs more space! In the meantime, we will continue to serve our students with 21st century technology within the confines of a well maintained, mid-20th century building. We are very proud of our students and staff and continue to appreciate the support of Whitman's residents and area employers.

2016 ANNUAL REPORT

1/30/2017

The South Shore Recycling Cooperative (SSRC) is a voluntary association of fourteen South Shore towns. It was established by Intermunicipal Agreement and Special Legislation in 1998 to help member towns improve their recycling programs, and reduce the amount, toxicity and cost of disposal.

Members of the SSRC are: **Abington, Cohasset, Duxbury, Hanover, Hanson, Hingham, Kingston, Middleborough, Norwell, Plymouth, Rockland, Scituate, Weymouth, and Whitman.** Representatives from each member town are appointed by Chief Elected Official(s) (*list attached*). Our Executive Board consists of Chairman Sharon White (Abington), Vice Chairman Merle Brown (Cohasset), Secretary Gene Wyatt (Kingston), and Treasurer Mary Snow (Cohasset).

In FY2016, the SSRC raised **\$72,642.27**: \$63,000 from municipal member dues, \$6,402.70 in sponsorships, \$3,125.62 in grant funding and 113.95 in interest. Those funds pay for the services of the Executive Director and for waste reduction and recycling activities that benefit our member towns. In addition to technical assistance, these activities **saved /earned Member Towns \$277,764** in 2016.

MATERIALS MANAGEMENT

Household Hazardous Waste Collections - The SSRC bids and administers a contract on behalf of its Member Towns for Household Hazardous Waste Collections. A new contract awarded to Stericycle in 2015 offers a much lower setup fee and unit costs than the State Contract. Member Towns saved staff time to bid, schedule and publicize collections. The Executive Director assisted at all twelve events, and administers the billing.

The SSRC enabled three Member Towns (Cohasset, Norwell and Rockland) to join their larger neighbors' HHW collections, relieving them of the time and expense of hosting their own. SSRC also coordinates five other Towns' alternating collections, Hanson the newest among them, plus Abington, Duxbury, Kingston and Whitman.

The SSRC arranges roll-off service at about \$350/event, \$550 less than the HHW contract cost.

2,001 residents attended **twelve collections** held in 2016. The contract also enabled **210 residents and businesses** to attend other Member Towns' collections using the **reciprocal arrangement**. This arrangement qualifies member towns for additional **Recycling Dividend Program** points, and earned them an extra **\$13,300** in grant money through that program.

The total cost savings and benefits of the HHW program in 2016 is estimated at **\$53,372**.

Electronic Waste - Shrinking markets for CRT glass posed a huge and costly challenge to municipal and retail collection programs in 2016. The processor for nine of our towns went out of business, and another that serviced three towns cut its municipal program. The Director engaged alternative vendors, and arranged an emergency pickup for Abington, Hanson, Rockland and Whitman. She continues to seek the best service and pricing from reputable service providers.

General Recyclables – Late 2016 saw some improvement in commodity pricing after a long period of low values. The SSRC kept the Member Town managers up to date on pricing trends through its subscription to the Yellow sheet, regular review of industry news, and contact with local outlets.

Textiles - Bay State Textiles has worked with SSRC to establish and promote transfer station and School Box Programs. BST pays \$100/ton to all box hosts for used textiles.

The thirteen SSRC towns and school systems hosting this program diverted 537 tons of textiles in 2016 and earned rebates and incentives of **\$53,700**. In addition, the diversion of this material from disposal saved another **\$39,763**.

Books - When the previous service provider went out of business, the SSRC introduced two companies that provide a similar service for books and media. The one that most selected pays \$100/ton. Rebates and avoided disposal costs in 2016 from this service came to **\$88,327**.

Mercury - Covanta SEMASS extends free mercury recycling benefits to all SSRC members, even those that don't send their MSW to SEMASS. SEMASS directly pays for mercury bearing waste delivered to Complete Recycling Solutions in Fall River. The

SSRC helped to get the direct pay accounts set up, and assists Member Towns in directing their material to avoid cost to the towns.

CRS direct-billed SEMASS **\$7,613** for Member Towns mercury recycling in 2016. In addition, SEMASS paid rebates to our contract communities of **\$2,038** for recycled mercury containing products. The director audited the deliveries and rebate payments.

Compost and Brush - The SSRC Board voted to extend its three contracts for **compost screening** and **brush grinding**. Abington, Cohasset, Duxbury, Hanover, Hingham, Kingston and Weymouth used these contracts in 2016.

PUBLIC OUTREACH:

17th Anniversary “Trash Bash” – A hundred municipal, county and state officials, staff, volunteers and service providers mingled and learned about contamination issues and costs in the recycling stream. The entire cost of the event was covered by private sponsors.

“Refrigerator door prizes” - The SSRC continued to distribute thousands of 5”x8” handouts, purchased in 2013 with grants from MassDEP and Covanta SEMASS. The graphics depict items that are “too good” and “too bad for the trash”, and direct the reader to the SSRC website and phone for more information. They have been resulted in many calls and web visits.

Kingston PAYT Forum- at the request of a selectman and the DPW Director, organized this public forum to introduce the concept of unit based pricing for trash, with three speakers.

Website - ssrcoop.info was completely revamped in 2016. The site provides both general and town-specific recycling and household hazardous waste collection information, SSRC meeting minutes and annual reports, a monthly newsletter, and links to other sites. It logged an average of 1,300 visits per month in 2016, 1,078 which were first time visitors.

Press Contacts - The SSRC is a resource to and a presence in print, web and cable media. In addition to help in editing articles by Town officials, the SSRC released [Holey Socks, they go in the donation box](#) (a requirement for additional grant funds for our member towns), as well as articles about the availability of Event recycling containers, and our 17th Anniversary Trash Bash.

Resident Contacts – The director fielded 160 calls and emails from residents in 2016 to answer questions about how to properly dispose of everything from paint to asbestos shingles, televisions to fire extinguishers.

Public and Professional Presentations - The Executive Director spoke to the following groups about recycling issues and/or SSRC activities:

- **MassRecycle R3 Conference:** the Mass. Product Stewardship Council
- **Cohasset Middle School Trash Patrol,** interview about sustainability
- **Southeast Municipal Recycling Council:** the Mass. Product Stewardship Council

Marshfield Fair Recycling - the SSRC exhibited and supported **recycling at the Marshfield Fair** for the thirteenth year. While public education is the priority, six tons

of material was also recycled and composted. Since inception, 73 tons of Fair waste has been diverted to higher use. The Director provided support on her own time as a volunteer.

ADVICE, ASSISTANCE AND NETWORKING.

The Executive Director's help is frequently sought by the solid waste managers. She stays current on local and national solid waste issues, attending conferences, meetings and webinars, touring local facilities, and reading professional publications. She advises Members on specific needs each town has.

A sample of the assistance she provided and problems she helped solve in 2016 includes:

- Attended meetings with the **Abington BOH, Hanson BOH, and Kingston BOH and BOS** at the request of our managers
- Helped **Duxbury, Hanson, Kingston, Plymouth, Rockland and Weymouth** complete and submit their DEP Data Surveys and/or DEP Grant applications
- Reviewed and provided feedback on the proposed curbside collection contract for **Rockland**
- Provided advice and help on a **wide range of issues** including: private hauler regulation notifications, enforceability of minimum tonnage in a disposal contract, fire extinguishers, e-waste options, sharps collection, redeemable bottle and can collection services, tire outlets and rebates for propane tank recycling.
- Provided index and regional **commodity pricing** for materials of interest to our managers.

Grant assistance: The SSRC assisted several member towns in applying for MassDEP Sustainable Material Recovery grants. Membership in SSRC adds one-two points to each Member Town's Recycling Dividend Program total for participation in our HHW Reciprocity Program, which earned our towns \$**13,200** of the \$**169,250** in grants nine of our Towns were awarded.

Newsletter - The SSRC publishes monthly **Updates** filled with information of interest to the South Shore solid waste community. The Updates are emailed to over 400 people, and are [posted online](#).

Monthly Meetings - The SSRC provides **networking opportunities** and information sharing at our well-attended (nearly) monthly meetings. Most meetings feature a guest speaker, usually a service provider or regulator. Solid waste collection, disposal, recycling service, outreach, pricing and proposed laws and regulations are discussed. Minutes are posted [here](#).

ADVOCACY

In 2016, the Executive Director

- Represented the SSRC at **policy meetings and conferences** hosted by MassDEP, Environmental Business Council, US EPA, MassRecycle, Northeast Resource Recovery Association, Product Stewardship Institute, Reuse Conex, and the Southeast Municipal Recycling Council. She reports relevant information back to the Board.
- Worked with Product Stewardship Institute, Mass. Municipal Association, the Mass. Product Stewardship Council and other organizations to promote legislation the Board deems beneficial to its solid waste programs regarding paint, Right to Repair, the Clean Environment Fund and universal recycling.
- Joined municipal colleagues on Beacon Hill for Paint Stewardship Advocacy Day, visiting most members of the South Shore delegation.
- Was invited to and attended the Mass. Recycling Contamination Workgroup meeting.

The SSRC exists to assist its member towns in improving their solid waste disposal and recycling functions. It always welcomes suggestions on how it can better serve its Members.

WHITMAN EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY (WEMA)

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of Whitman:

The year of 2016 was a steady year for Emergency Management even with limited storm and blizzard events.

Homeland Security planning, training and response was continued on a national and local level. FEMA requested responses for training in Incident Command, Regional Resource Control and Emergency Response.

Whitman Emergency Management continued with our Regional partnership of the Sachem Skill Emergency Management Planning Zone, which included the communities of Whitman, East Bridgewater, Bridgewater, West Bridgewater, Raynham, Halifax and Hanson. This Emergency Zone Group has taken the lead in emergency preparedness on a regional basis. We are pooling our resources, established two regional shelters and we train as a regional team. This will provide for a more efficient use of personnel and resources, and provide continuity to our area regarding emergency management and sheltering.

The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) continued its training and service throughout the year. The group was activated for a variety of incidents during the year and performed professionally as they always do. Additionally, the CERT Rehab Unit provided refreshments and shelter at all working fires in Whitman and local area towns as requested.

In all major emergencies, we coordinated our operations with the MEMA Region II office in Bridgewater and State EOC in Framingham. Regular meetings are held by MEMA Region II with information and training for all area directors and personnel to coordinate local and state plans for handling emergencies.

Federal assistance and grant reports to State and Federal Emergency Management are coordinated by Administrative Assistant Lisa Riley. Notifications of CERT meetings and events as well as emergency response call out to volunteers are also performed by Mrs. Riley.

Reimbursement was received for the 2015 storms. After the dedicated work of Administrative Assistant Lisa Riley and those departments affected, the Town was reimbursed just over \$84,000.00 for storm related costs.

We continue to work with our Board of Health in the ready state, updating our dispensary location for mass inoculation should the need ever arise.

Thank you to Deputy Fire Chief Joe Feeney, Deputy Director Operations, and Police Chief Scott Benton, Deputy Director Security, for their support and assistance throughout the year.

A special thank you needs to go to my Administrative Assistant Lisa Riley. Her dedication to this Town and expertise with FEMA and MEMA policy is to be commended.

I thank all the town officials who have assisted me in fulfilling the requirements of this agency. Thanks to our CERT members and volunteers for the many hours given up to assist us at incidents throughout the year.

Also, thank you to the citizens of Whitman for their cooperation and understanding during some difficult times during the incidents. It has been my privilege to serve you.

I am pleased to submit The Technology Department’s Annual Report for fiscal year 2016.

I would like to thank the residents of Whitman for their continued support of Information Technology and the FY2016 budget. It was a challenging year, but with the appropriate funding we were able to replace a 13 year old copier at the library and older core networking equipment at the Town Hall. We were also able to continue the investment for future infrastructure requirements.

Our efforts to implement a centralized datacenter continue to reduce overall costs while providing services for various departments. We always look for more creative ways in which we can provide the same level of service to our constituents. There are a number of ways to accomplish the same tasks these days and making small changes can yield significant savings over time.

In an effort to better understand overall printing costs we implemented HP Sure Supply, a free program that allows us to monitor printing, track printer performance, and receive supply alert notifications. In addition the software also provides automatic ordering capabilities to ensure toner is available at all times. We are now able to generate reports that provide details for each printer which will help us plan for and support printer replacement.

The new police cruisers were equipped with Microsoft Surface tablets in an effort to save money and provide faster performance. While Panasonic Toughbooks have been the standard for years and used by many public safety departments they are very expensive so we decided to try something different.

We continue to enhance our social media presence and many departments share information faster and more efficiently with the community every day. In many cases messages received by various departments are answered within an hour.

We also continue to look at ways we can improve internal business processes in an effort to save money while still providing the best possible service.

I want to thank all Town departments for their patience and understanding as change can be difficult. We worked through a number of changes including software upgrades, hardware replacements, and process improvements to increase efficiency.

REPORT OF THE VETERANS' SERVICES OFFICE

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and the Citizens of the Town of Whitman,

I respectfully submit the Annual Report as Services/Veterans' Service Officer. This is our 2nd year operating as the Abington – Whitman Veterans' District. All Veterans' Service Officers administer benefits pursuant to Massachusetts General Law (M.G.L.) Chapter 115 and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Regulations (C.M.R.) 108 to eligible veterans in need.

In fact, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts is the only state in the union which by state law provides **medical, burial, housing, clothing, food, employment and financial** assistance as well as any other necessary support to Veterans and their dependents, with dignity and sensitivity.

Throughout the past year, your Department of Veterans' Services has assisted Whitman Residents with the following:

- Chapter 115 – Benefits paid to town veterans/dependents for the Calendar year 2016 totaled \$188,302.73
- Annuity Payments – for blind, paraplegic, 100% disabled veterans and Gold Star parents and spouses.
- Veterans Administration Benefits – Dependency and Indemnity Compensation (D.I.C.) for surviving spouse or children.
- Veterans' Application for VA disability compensation or pension.
- Military Records Retrieval and Retention for Discharge or for Medical Assistance.
- Education Assistance and Employment Counseling.
- Medical-Explanation of various Federal or State medical plans
- Alcohol and Drug dependency – Counseling/Referral.
- Other state benefits offered from the Commonwealth are, Active Duty Discharge Bonuses, Outreach and Housing, Property, Automobile, and Excise Tax exemptions and Veterans License Plates.

Over the course of the past year, this office has received and disseminated new information to Town veterans'/dependents regarding Nursing Homes, Soldiers Homes, V.A. National Cemetery (Bourne, MA) as well as the two state Veterans Cemeteries (Agawam and Winchendon). We have provided assistance, to many needy veterans in conjunction with the American Legion Post #22, Veterans of Foreign Wars Post #697, Disabled American Veterans Chapter #119, Council on Aging; and have coordinated with the Fire and Police Departments for the annual Memorial Day Parade, Ceremonies, and the Tri-Town Veterans Day Parade.

ANNUAL REPORT-2016

As of October 1, 2016, there were 4,044 students enrolled pre-kindergarten through grade twelve in the Whitman-Hanson Regional School District. This is a decrease of 66 students from October 1, 2015. Enrollment has decreased at Hanson Middle School, Duval School, Indian Head School, and the Whitman-Hanson Regional High School. Enrollment has increased at Whitman Middle School, and Maquan School. The high school's enrollment includes 43 School Choice students. Nearly 30% of the students in Whitman-Hanson are classified qualify for free and reduced lunch. This percentage is has increased by almost 4 % from last year.

The District provides an array of educational services in order to meet the learning needs of a wide range of students. The District operates and funds an integrated pre-kindergarten program at the Maquan School in Hanson that provides early childhood education for young children in both towns. Through the early intervention program, 37 young children with Individual Education Plans attend school with 66 typically developing peers. In addition, the school district provides a range of special education programs for 479 students, ages 6 to 21. As of October 1, 2016, 44 students receive special education services out-of-district. The number of English Language Learners in the District increased dramatically from 5 on October 1, 2015 to 21 on October 1, 2016. Since October 1, five additional English Language Learners have enrolled. Nine additional students classified as Former English Learners (FEL). Their progress is monitored for four years after they have achieved proficiency. In compliance with state laws and regulations, the District provides a Sheltered English Immersion program for English Language Learners. The District's Title I entitlement grant, a federal academic support program, provides supplemental academic support in literacy and numeracy to 168 regular education students at the Conley, Duval, and Whitman Middle Schools, the schools with the largest number of low income students.

Other educational services include, but are not limited to, advanced placement courses, online education, alternative education options, athletic opportunities, access to technology, and community service learning. These programs are rooted in a solid academic program that begins in pre-kindergarten classrooms. Transitional services were included in the high school program a year ago for the purpose of assisting students who have been hospitalized for physical or mental health reasons in their re-entry into the high school following extend absences. During the first year of the transition program, the number of repeat hospitalizations declined. For the first trimester of the 2016-2017 school year, the number of hospitalizations social emotional and behavioral health concerns has increased throughout the school system.

The coordination of curriculum and instruction from pre-kindergarten through grade 12 is essential to ensuring that students graduate from Whitman-Hanson well-prepared for college and careers. Curriculum directors for English language arts, science, history/social studies, and mathematics are working at elementary, middle, and high school levels. The Director of Foreign Languages teaches at the high school and coordinates the middle and high school Spanish and French programs. The goal of this model is to involve content specialists at all levels of instruction and to ensure consistency and equity in the delivery of high quality instruction throughout the school system. This coordination model is in its second year of implementation. Early evidence indicates that the model is effective and essential to improving student achievement.

In May, School Committee elections were held. Dan Cullity (Whitman) and Kevin Lynam (Whitman) were re-elected. Chris Howard (Hanson) and Michael Jones (Hanson) were elected, replacing Don Ford and Susan McSweeney. Robert Hayes (Hanson) was re-elected as Chair of the Regional School Committee in May. Fred Small was elected as Vice-Chair.

Leadership changes in 2016 were the appointments of Dr. Elizabeth Wilcox to the position of Principal of Maquan School on July 1 and of Thomas Tracey to the position of Assistant Principal at the Duval School.

The operating budget for the fiscal year 2017 (school year 2016-2017) was approved by the School Committee at \$47,079,141 representing a 3% increase in the budget. The FY2016-2017 budget was presented as a Student Success Budget that included the costs of a level service budget and an additional \$3,000,000 to restore programs eliminated in the past, to improve class size ratios, and to provide funding for safety and security resources, technology support, the arts, and instructional materials.

The current budget represents the level service budget that was approved at Town Meetings on May 2. The additional \$3,000,000 was not approved as an operational override. Following unsuccessful ballot vote, increased per pupil funding from the state, the transfer of funds from Excess and Deficiency by the Regional School Committee to reduce class size, and funding from the Gelfand Family Foundation for elementary science provided additional financial resources for the library media program, class size reduction, and elementary science.

During the past year, the school district continued to be awarded grants that enhance opportunities for students. In addition to the federal annual entitlement and allocation grants for Title I, Title IIA (Teacher Quality), and special education, the District is now in the sixth year of implementing a multi-year, competitive Massachusetts 21st Century Community Learning Centers grant that provides funds to support academic success and college readiness for at-risk high school students. In November, the District was awarded a \$20,000 Safe and Supportive Schools grant to develop action plans that organize, integrate, and sustain school and district-wide efforts to create safe and supportive school environments and coordinate and align student support initiatives.

An ongoing grant from the Gelfand Family Trust to improve STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) at the elementary school level is in its third year of implementation. In 2014-2015, the Know Atom science program was introduced at grade 2. In 2014-2015, grade 3 has been added. During the current school year, grades 4 and 5 are being implemented. In addition, the Gelfand Foundation has committed to funding kindergarten and grade 1. This totals a final contribution from the Gelfand Foundation for elementary STEM education to over \$300,000. Throughout the school year, Early Childhood Coordinator, Patricia Poirier-Collins, has successfully obtains grants that assist programming in the integrated pre-school program at Maquan School.

The District benefits from its multiple partnerships with educational collaboratives that provide specialized programs for students, expanded professional development opportunities, and participation in grant-funded programs. The District is a member of North River Collaborative (NRC), Pilgrim Area Collaborative (PAC), and Southeastern Regional Collaborative Organization (SCRO). As a member of SCRO, the school system participates in the Smart PD program and is involved in exploring options for on-line learning. On December 15 and 16, SCRO offered a Behavioral Health Symposium for area school systems. Dr. John Queally was an active member of the symposium planning team. In conjunction with North River Collaborative and member school districts, the District is a participant in a Title III, a federal grant program that supports educational opportunities for English Language Learners and the Behavioral Health Initiative (BHI), a US Department of Education competitive grant, that provides

Whitman-Hanson and other member districts with social workers at the elementary level, educator training, and consultation. Funding for the BHI grant ends in June 2017.

Maintaining high quality educational programs for all students is the focus of the administration and the School Committee. The Leadership Team met regularly in 2016 to develop core values and priorities which assist our team in making informed decisions.

Statewide testing continues to be an important part of our assessment program in the Whitman-Hanson Regional School District. The content of the statewide assessments has been in flux for the last three years. Last spring, Whitman-Hanson students participated in annual statewide testing, administered by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE). The testing consisted of a combination of MCAS and Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers (PARCC) assessments. Students in grades 3-8 participated in online PARCC assessments in English language arts (ELA) and mathematics and paper/pencil MCAS tests in science at grades 5 and 8. At the high school, students took paper/pencil MCAS assessments in ELA, mathematics, and science as the high stakes tests for graduation. It is important to note that the PARCC tests in 2016 were a revision of the PARCC tests in 2015, the result of concerns about the length of the testing time period.

In November of 2015, the Massachusetts Board of Education (BOE) voted to move from the traditional MCAS to “next-Generation MCAS” for testing in the spring of 2017. This assessment will be built on aspects of MCAS, include PARCC-like questions, and align with the Massachusetts learning standards, currently undergoing revisions in English Language Arts and Mathematics. Next generation science standards were released in April of 2016. Although not assessed at the state level, the History Social Science Curriculum Frameworks are also being revised.

Because Whitman-Hanson used PARCC as well as MCAS in 2015, the District has been “held harmless,” meaning that achievement levels either stay the same or improve. They cannot go down. For the spring 2016 statewide testing, the overall level for the district remained at Level 2, on a scale of 1 to 5 with 1 being the highest. WHRHS and Indian Head remained at Level 1. WMS, HMS, and Duval remained at Level 2. These levels are based on PARCC scores in ELA and math for the elementary and middle schools, and MCAS scores for all science and for the grade 10 high stakes test. For spring 2017, students will take the next generation MCAS in ELA, math and science. The high school will be MCAS only with the grade 10 high stakes tests. Once again, Whitman-Hanson will be “held harmless.”

Our goal continues to be to reach academic proficiency for all students and to make certain that they graduate from Whitman-Hanson as capable and competent citizens. Teachers at all levels are diligent in their efforts to prepare students for state assessments. At specific levels, subject areas, and in each school, teachers and administrators review student data, identify target areas, and proficiency gaps where improvement is needed. Each school and the District develop annual improvement plans to reflect strengths and to address weaknesses that are made apparent through testing.

At the high school, a greater emphasis is being placed on the preparation of secondary students for the SAT and for Advanced Placement exams. All students take the PSAT in tenth grade. On January 11, 2013, the high school was awarded continued accreditation by the New England Association School and Colleges (NEASC) accreditation. Accreditation by NEASC is approved for a ten year time period.

On Friday, June 3, two hundred and seventy-five students graduated from Whitman-Hanson Regional High School. The awards and scholarships, received by the Class of 2016, are listed in this annual report. Over \$220,000 in scholarships were awarded to the members of the Class of 2016 in Community and Dollars for Scholars (DFS) scholarships. At graduation, senior awards night, music awards night, and the Kiwanis Banquet, many students were recognized for their academic performance, athletic achievements, and involvement in school organizations and extracurricular activities. On Thursday, June 2, thirty students received their diplomas as graduates of the Whitman-Hanson Community Evening School, a program that provides students with the opportunity for the completion of an approved high school program through an alternative educational setting.

The use of instructional technology in Whitman-Hanson classrooms continues to expand. Today's students, as digital learners, respond well to the instructional use of interactive electronic white boards, Chrome Books, net books, iPads, electronic texts and databases, assistive technology, and an array of software programs that differentiate to accommodate students' learning needs. We continue to work toward preparing Whitman-Hanson students to be globally-ready with the skills they will need to effectively participate in an increasingly interconnected world. The integration of technology into the curriculum, foreign language study, and the fostering of international partnerships are important components of this preparation. As the state transitions to the "next generation MCAS," statewide assessments will eventually become entirely computer-based. By 2019, testing in grades 3-8 ELA and math, and grade 5 and 8 Science, Technology, and Engineering will be electronic.

Throughout the past school year and continuing into the current school year, the District has been in the process of converting to virtualization. Virtualization centralizes the individual's hard drive and operating system in the district's data center, creating an on-premise "cloud" network. This enables users to access technology, anytime, anywhere and with any device or platform whether users are at school or at home. The existing school desktops are re-used as "thin clients" because only keyboards and screens are needed. Since individual hard drives are no longer needed, replacement device costs are less than \$200. The feedback from staff and students is positive due to improved connection and response time and ongoing access to the District's technology from any location at any time.

The Panther Education Trust has continued their efforts in supporting secondary education at the high school at the high school. During 2016, successful events included the Fitness Fair and the Touch-A-Truck.

With the exception of the regional high school, the Towns of Whitman and Hanson own their school buildings. The maintenance of the schools is a shared responsibility with the towns responsible for capital costs and improvements that exceed \$5,000. The Facilities Department, under the management of Director Ernest Sandland, works with the towns for preventative maintenance and to address capital issues when they arise.

The District continues to work with teachers, students, parents, town departments, and the communities in a concerted effort to prevent bullying in our schools and neighborhoods. *Responsive Classroom* at the elementary level and the *Peacebuilders* program in the middle schools and at the high school are two programs that are used in the schools.

During the 2015-2016 school year, the Whitman-Hanson Bullying Task Force expanded to address the issues of behavioral health and social and emotional learning. A Wellness Steering Committee was established and meets regularly to address the issues of social and emotional health and well-being. The district is an active participant in Whitman-Hanson WILL, a program funding by a grant from the Plymouth County District Attorney's office to address substance abuse in southeastern Massachusetts. Because today's students are subject to influences and information that are far more pervasive and invasive than they were in the past, the District recognizes that career and college readiness requires that Whitman-Hanson students have both healthy minds and healthy bodies.

Whitman-Hanson is committed to ensuring proactive, preventative measures in incident planning. The District provides staff with training and information regarding ALICE (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, & Evacuate), a program designed to provide options for response during an active intruder/shooter situation. ALICE is included as a response in the Incident Management Handbook.

Assistant Superintendent, Dr. Pat Dillon, is working with administrators and safety personnel to develop a Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan (CEMP) for the District. The safety of Whitman-Hanson students and staff is a top priority. The District reviews plans and protocols on an ongoing basis. Listed below are focus areas for safety and security.

- Incident Management Handbook
- Protocols – Bomb threat, chain of command communication
- Posted evacuation routes and response procedures
- Trained administrative leadership staff in the National Incident Management System (NIMS) response procedures
- Documented and tested incident response plans
- Staff trained to report anything that appears to be out of the ordinary

- Classroom, hallway, and office supervision
- Secured doors with electronic access control which allows for immediate lock down and recorded surveillance systems
- Strategically placed security cameras in our buildings and on school buses
- Clear counseling requirements and post incident response plans
- Close relationships with our local public safety officials, including response drills both involving and not involving staff and students
- Debriefing sessions with public safety officials, directors, and administrators, following a variety of incidents
- School safety officers from both Whitman (Officer Kevin Harrington) and Hanson (Officer Bill Frazier) Police Departments

The District continues to work closely with our public safety officials, our community leaders, our staff, parents, and students to provide the safest and most secure environment for the school community.

During the 2014-2015 school year, the Whitman-Hanson Regional School District was selected by the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) to participate in the piloting of *Planning for Success*, a model that supports the improvement planning process and consists of three phases: *Create a Plan*, *Align Systems*, and *Implement*. As a piloting school district, DESE provided WHRSD at no cost with a trained facilitator, Lori Likis, Principal Consultant, Creative Coaching; multiple resources; and protocols for data analysis and information gathering. Throughout the 2015-2016 school year, the Leadership Team and the full Administrative Team completed the Strategic Plan for the next three years. Three Pillars of the plan are I) Every Child, Every Day with Healthy Minds and Healthy Bodies, II) A cohesive PreK-12 System of Teaching and Learning, and III) Safe and Secure Schools. In August, Action Plans for 2016-2017 were written and on October 12, 2016, the Regional School Committee approved the Strategic Plan for 2016-2019. The District has also been selected to participate in the Resource Allocation and District Action Reports (RADAR), DESE's project to pilot a new set of reports to support strategic planning and budget decision making and to help the Department develop tools and resources that can be useful to districts statewide. The RADAR project and Planning for Success are designed to support each other.

The dedicated efforts and support of staff, parents, PTOs, PACs, booster groups, School Councils, the Panther Education Foundation, and community members are greatly appreciated by the District and by the Regional School Committee. The Whitman-Hanson Regional School District benefits from the commitment of the Towns of Whitman and Hanson to the education and well-being of children. Every Child – Every Day!

During the coding event, students try to solve puzzles and complete creative activities to teach students computational thinking and the basics of computer programming students solve each puzzle by programming visual code blocks to reach their goal.

Students who did not have the opportunity to participate in the HOUR of CODE during the school day, Julie Giglia, Business/Technology teacher hosted an after school opportunity where students could come and participate and be exposed to more advanced programming techniques like Java Scripts through Khan Academy. For those who participated, students got a certificate of Coding Competence and for the after school event, high school principal, Jeff Szymaniak, provided free pizza to those who partook in the HOUR of CODE event.

The Fair is an interactive exercise where students visit booths to learn about financial decisions for various services and living expenses such as cell phone, clothing, groceries, renting an apartment, leasing or buying a car, and community service options. Throughout the process students are challenged to balance their budgets and make practical financial decisions. The vendor booths are local businesses (banks, insurance companies, car dealer) and volunteers that discuss the cost of living items with the students. The major sponsor was Mutual Bank in Whitman. Other sponsors included: Rockland Trust, Blue Hills Bank, Eastern Insurance, Massachusetts State Treasurer & Receiver General, Eastern Insurance, Whole Foods, and McLaughlin Chevrolet. The event included over 250 high school seniors, 65 community volunteers and a Credit for Life Executive team which included Business teachers, Julie Giglia and Lydia Nelson, and two guidance counselors, Maureen Garrett and Dom Amado. The program kicked off with introductions from local politicians enhancing the importance of being financially responsible from State Representative Geoff Diehl, State Senator Michael Brady, and State Representative Josh Cutler. Overall, the Credit for Life Fair was successful for the community, students, and Whitman-Hanson faculty to hold this first inaugural event during Financial Literacy month.

Whitman-Hanson Students create “Keychains against Cancer”

In the spring of 2016, a social entrepreneurship element was added to the Related Business high school entrepreneurship class offerings. Student’s researched ideas for the class to create a product and donate any funds raised from the sale to a charitable cause. The final project was to create 3D printed key chains designed and created by students. The project was called **Keychains against Cancer**. Four student teams were created for this non-profit venture:

Sales Team- Meet with customers, deliver key chains when sales person cannot, consult customers for reviews/Provide customer service when necessary, keep track of sales and deliveries.

Marketing Team - Create posters, tags, and get the word out about our product using social media (twitter and email), package key chains.

Manufacturing Team – Design key chains, run the 3D printer, watch 3D printer in case of malfunction.

Finance Team - Keep track of and collect all money, collaborate with other teams to ensure people have paid before receiving the product.

Key chains were sold for \$5 each and my entrepreneurship class sold 95 key chains and collected revenue, of which \$475 was donated to South Shore Hospitals Cancer Care Unit. The charity executive was invited to the high school for a reception and check presentation to South Shore Hospital. Students completed anonymous peer student review assessment surveys to grade each other and additionally students were required, individually or in teams of two, to create a business plan PowerPoint on this social entrepreneurship project and present it to the class. Bringing real-world experience into the curriculum through service-learning and through instructor involvement to design opportunities in the classroom and in community service involvement can improve a student’s experience and have an impact on their learning. Projects like Keychains for Cancer motivated students to learn and become involved.
